Committee meetings and a board of director's session also were held during the three-day event, Pecora said.

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
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## Father-Son Combo Win Cub Derby

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## Area Plant Gets Major Contract

A fixed price contract has been awarded Douglas Aircraft Company, Inc., by the Department of the Air Force of Washington, D.C., according to an announcement by Congressman Alphonzo Bell (R-Los Angeles). The work will be performed at the Torrance plant.

The Department of the Air Force is obligating an initial increment of \$2,390,871 and the final amount of this contract will be \$4,781,742.

The contract award will enable Douglas to proceed with production of bomb ejector racks for F-4 series aircraft.

Congressman Bell is a member of the House Science and Astronautics committee.
