Some 40 positions about which employ groups or city officers disagree with the Jacobs survey will be studied during the next few months. Final decisions as to placement, salary, and other conditions will be made by the city's Civil Service Commission.

WHERE JOB titles or positions have been changed or upgraded, persons now holding those jobs will be entitled to full civil service protection in their new positions. In addition to the individual adjustments and the 2 1/2 per cent general increase, a 5 per cent night differential was retained.

The only city employ not affected by last night's action is Ferraro. His salary, now \$21,140, is set by resolution of the council. Highest salary on the scale adopted last night will be paid to City Attorney Stanley Remelmeier, who will draw \$22,300 annually, Scharfman said.

Purpose of the survey, requested last July by Ken Miller, was to eliminate inequities in job classifications and to establish an equitable salary scale. Last night's action ended nearly eight months of work on the survey.


