



**School Nurses Keep Busy Pace**

School nurses and doctors with 3,633 elementary school parents and 1,839 high school parents and conferred with first half of the present school year, according to a semi-annual report on health services just released by Dr. Louis Kaplan, assistant superintendent for special services and research.

Largest number of youngsters came into contact with school nurses during office visits for first aid. Nurses assisted 7,102 elementary school youngsters and 10,645 high school students during office calls in the first five months of this year.

They sent home 2,105 sick elementary school pupils and 2,691 high school students in this period. In addition, they paid 464 house calls to the families of elementary children and 62 house calls to families of high school youngsters.

VISION screening tests were administered to 6,901 elementary school pupils and 1,649 high school students and hearing tests to 5,020 elementary school children and 661 high school youngsters.

School doctors conducted 1,264 routine elementary physical appraisals and 659 routine high school appraisals in addition to 379 special elementary appraisals and 46 special high school appraisals.

In addition, school health personnel held conferences with 3,633 elementary school parents and 1,839 high school parents and conferred with 1,684 elementary teachers and 855 high school teachers. They conducted 1,243 elementary student conferences, 6,446 high school student conferences, and 695 other elementary conferences and 363 other high school conferences.

CASE HISTORIES were completed by nurses on 293 elementary school students and 27 high school students.

Besides assisting students and parents in office calls, vision and hearing tests, home visits, and conferences, school nurses conducted 107 meetings for parents, students, and faculty.

Students with health problems were referred by school doctors to their family physicians following school examinations in 691 elementary school cases and 484 high school cases.

SCHOOL physicians participated in staffings and in-service education with the faculty and assisted in general education, according to the report.

Nurses also served as advisors to medical career clubs and nursing skills classes and were involved in curriculum planning and in-service education.

**Menvig Names Gibson as Senate Campaign Leader**

Councilman John S. Gibson Jr. has accepted the honorary chairmanship of the Menvig for Senate Committee, it was announced this week by Lloyd A. Menvig, Democratic candidate for state senator in the 32nd district.

"The continued industrial expansion and high rate of employment in this area are closely related to the operations and commerce of the Los Angeles and Long Beach harbors," Councilman Gibson said.

"During the eight years that Lloyd Menvig was president of the Los Angeles Harbor Commission, the outstanding development of new facilities and expansion of international trade stimulated the economy not only of this district, but of the entire Southland," Gibson stated.

"With Lloyd Menvig in the State Senate, we will have a representative who is keenly aware of the interrelationship of these factors in the healthy overall development of our area — in regard to both people and production. He has stated, for example, that he hopes to find a way to utilize state income from the development of our tidelands oilfields, so that some of the tax burden may be lifted from property owners. He has pledged his support of legislation for a two per cent ceiling on property tax assessments and for a statewide uniform assessment law.
