The film, a Columbia Pictures release based on a book by Joy Adamson, tells the story of Miss Adamson's adventures in Kenya, Africa, with Elsa the Lioness. Miss Adamson took Elsa into her home as a tiny cub, raised her until she was grown, then trained her to return to her natural habitat.

The group—all senior high school girls—is selected on the basis of scholastic standing, community service, leadership, and interest in fashion and merchandising careers.

Ner Tamid to Hold Officer Installation


Installation of Synagogue and Sisterhood officers and directors of Congregation Ner Tamid of South B.y will be held April 15.
