Each chapter has a youth group "Garland," for youngsters to age 16, who are taught Polish folk dancing, music and language. The Alliance also sponsors a scholarship fund and contributes regularly to the Catholic University in Lublin, Poland.

Mrs. Lois Carlson, widow of Paul Carlson, MD, the medical missionary who was treacherously shot in the Congo, will speak to the Little Company of Mary Hospital Auxiliary on Wednesday, April 13 at 8 p.m. in the doctors' dining room of the hospital.

Mrs. Carlson will show slides of life on the Ubangi plateau, Wasolo, and tell of the Carlsons' earlier decision to leave a comfortable medical practice here in Southern California to go to the Congo to minister to the medical and spiritual needs of the natives. "Monganga Paul" is the title of Mrs. Carlson's book, just published, which tells the story in its entirety. "Monganga" means "doctor" in the Lingala language. Her book published by Harper and Row, has been chosen book of the month for May by the Christian Herald Book Club.

According to Mrs. Karl Ransom, Auxiliary president, the public is invited to the meeting because: "The account of the extraordinary moral force of the quiet heroism of Paul Carlson cannot fail to interest all. In the final days as thousands about him were losing their balance, he went on serving in the jail cells of Stanleyville as he had in the steaming jungles of the Congo, as a witness for Christ, living his faith, and inspiring millions by his example."

GOP Women to Hear County Tax Assessor

Philip E. Watson, Los Angeles County Assessor, will discuss the tax problems of Los Angeles County at a noon luncheon of the South Bay Club of Federated Republican Women Thursday, April 14, in Smith Brothers' Indian Village restaurant.

Since his election in 1962, Watson has instituted a number of reforms in the Assessor's Department. The most basic of these changes was to announce that all assessments would be made at 25 per cent of market value, which for the first time gave property owners a yardstick to measure the equity of their assessments.

He has also been active in advocating reforms at the legislative level in order to improve assessment administration and to achieve greater equity for all taxpayers.

Prior to his present position, Watson was a private tax consultant. From 1949 to 1959 he served in the Los Angeles County Assessor's office. He worked in the tax department of Lockheed Aircraft Corporation, California Division, and in Real Estate sales. During World War II, he was an Army Air Force pilot.

Watson belongs to numerous organizations including the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars and Al Malakiah Shrine. He is a Past Master of Masonic Lodge 467 in Culver City. He is a member of Knights Templar of California, Los

Angeles Commandery No. 9; the Elks Club of Culver City and St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Palms.
