Shakespearean Scholar Guest of AAUW Feb. 8

Dr. Fallon Evans, associate professor of English, Immaculate Heart College, will be the featured speaker at the Monday, Feb. 8, meeting of the Manhattan Beach Branch, American Association of University Women.

Dr. Evans will present "Creativity in Twentieth Century Literature" at the Manhattan Beach Community Church, 303 South Peck Ave., Manhattan Beach.

Shakespearean scholar and authority on modern literature, Dr. Evans has authored two comic novels, "The Trouble with Turlow" and "Pistols and Pedagogues," the latter recently published in German under the title "Skandal in Stratford."

Past president and executive board member of the California Association of Teachers of English, he is editor of "Twentieth Century Literature" and a reviewer for "The Critic." He is host for the college Looks at Literature series, and is widely known as a lecturer on Shakespeare, modern lit-

erature and Ecumenical affairs.

Dr. Evans was graduated magna cum laude from the University of Notre Dame, and earned his master's degree from the University of Chicago and his doctorate from the University of Denver. He previously taught at Duquesne University.
