That population in the United States and throughout the world is increasing is not news. The rate of the increase continues to be news. Almost 3.4 billion human beings inhabit the earth today. By 1980 according to a United Nations projection, world population will approximate 4.3 billion. To know where this growth is taking place is to know where areas of tension and turmoil will be in the years ahead.

America and Africa account for another 16 per cent. Between 1960 and 1980, Asia will have the largest numerical gain and Latin America will have the largest proportional gain. By 1980 Latin America with 374 million people will exceed the total in North America by more than 100 million!

Africa, Asia, and Latin America have birth rates ranging from 40 to 50 births per 1,000 population per year. Birth rates in Europe and North America are generally below 25 per 1,000 population per year. Death rates range from over 25 for

each 1,000 inhabitants in Asia and Africa each year to less than 10 in Europe and North America.

population control might be made available to Governments of other countries which would make their own judgment as to its use.

Senator Fulbright added an amendment to the Foreign Assistance Act on Oct. 22, 1963, to make money available to foreign countries to investigate population problems and to provide technical assistance in this effort. President Johnson indicated his own attitude for the first time in public in his January State Of The Union Address although his language was circumspect: "I will seek new ways to use

our new knowledge to help deal with the explosion in world population. . . . IT IS IMPOSSIBLE to understand the magnitude of public policy problems created by soaring population except by specific example. Between 1960 and 1980 Mexico's expected increase will be approximately 25 million. This is equal to Mexico's total growth during the past four centuries! This growth is taking place in a country one-fourth the size of the United States and land much of which is hostile to agriculture and other forms of development. Mexico has made impressive advances in recent years to reduce poverty and to increase the education and health-rate of her people. Such gains would be quickly lost in an overwhelmingly high tide of new population. If these gains are lost, if Mexico is forced to reconcile itself to have-not status, this south of the border nation, so close to the United States and so aware of our high standards of living, will surely become a center of revolution.

Drain Put In Service

Installation of nearly three miles of additional storm drain facilities serving the Torrance-Lomita area has been completed by the County Flood Control District.

Known as the second unit of the South Torrance drain, the \$512,874 project was completed Jan. 29 by the N. A. Artukovich Contracting.

Salsbury said two lines were installed as part of the project. One line begins at Pacific Coast Highway and Hillworth Avenue and extends along several streets to join another drain at 248th Street.

The second line, which begins at Main and 226th streets, runs into the Dominguez Channel.
