IN SAN DIEGO Chamber Leaders Plan Trip for 1965 Forum

Members of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce have been invited by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States to attend the 1965 Leadership Forum to be held in San Diego Wednesday. The forum is the 1965 version of the Arcades for Citizenship Action. The format has been changed and deals with important current trends and developments in government and business, in economics and social order in politics. It also will examine the role of the individual in a free-market economy and in self government, and particularly the role of the individual as a leader in his own community.

Arthur L. Reeves, chamber president, has urged members to make plans to attend the San Diego Forum. Several local business leaders are already planning to attend along with Reeves and chamber general manager, J. Walker Owens, vice president, Bruce Jones and Don Hyde, and directors William Belding, John Tweedy, and George Post.

Youth for Christ to Sponsor 'Spurrlows'

Opening their second week of concerts in greater Los Angeles, 27 youthful musicians called "The Spurrlows" will present their "Splendor of Sacred Song" concert Monday, at 8:15 p.m., in the Mira Costa High School Auditorium. They are sponsored by the Cup of Gold Water Ministry of Redondo Beach and Youth for Christ in the West, Los Angeles-South Bay area.

The 60-minute film, "Face the Music," which features The Spurrlows, will be shown later in the week on March 13, 7:18 p.m., by Youth for Christ in the Community Baptist Church, Artesia and Prospect, Manhattan Beach.

The Spurrlows, currently on their fourth national tour, were organized in 1960 by Thurlow Spurr who directs the two and a half hour concert of choral numbers, orchestration and choreography which has catapulted the college age young people to fame. In day-time high school assemblies they are sponsored by a leading Detroit automotive corporation. The Spurrlows will appear in 65 assemblies at 39 high schools in the Greater Los Angeles Area this month.

County Will Take Dispute To Court


