Television Host Will Talk on 'Learning Gap'

Radio and television performer John Milton Kennedy, host of the "Science in Action" television series sponsored by Southern California Edison Co., will address area school administrators at a series of dinner meetings April 6, 7, and 8.
Kennedy, an official representative of the Edison Co. off the air as well as on television, will discuss "The Learning Gap—A Threat to Freedom."
Despite the best efforts of competent and dedicated teachers, Kennedy says, this country is "raising a generation of economic illiterates."
"By this I don't mean to imply that our younger generation is stupid," Kennedy explains. "Far from it, but our young people simply are not being taught the economic facts of life."
The fault, he says, is with the curricula of our nation's high schools, which usually include little, if anything, on economics.
Kennedy will outline what he believes can be done and what is being done to close the "learning gap."
