## Marines Will Land Here For Armed Forces Parade

Torrance Princess Pam Wilson, visiting the 3rd Marine Air Wing at El Toro, couldn't help wondering whether the Armed Forces Day Parade participants she was welcoming would be on the battlefield tomorrow.

Pam, an 18-year-old blonde, got an intimate view of combat-tested Marine helicopters. Now, as she hears newscasts describing Marine air action in Viet Nam, Pam recollects vivid impressions of her visit.

The men of the 3rd Marine Air Wing, trained in the tactical and strategic use of helicopters, have already seen teams from their squadrons dispatched to the Far East. Of the three types of Marine helicopters which Pam inspected, two are now being used in Viet Nam. The third is a huge, tandem rotor jet-type being employed exclusively for training purposes. All three are slated for display at Torrance Armed Forces Day Parade sponsored by the city and the Torrance Chamber of Commerce.

Marine entries coming from Camp Pendleton to the Torrance parade will include the 1st Marine Division Band, Mounted Color Guard, a platoon of Women Marines, and 200 trained and combat-ready Leathernecks in full battle dress from "K" Company, 3rd Battalion, 7th Marine Regiment. This battalion recently returned from the Far East where they participated in the Gulf of Ton-

kin incident while aboard ships of the U. S. 7th Fleet.

SPECTATORS of last year's Torrance parade will remember that "E" Company, 2nd Battalion, from Camp Pendleton won distinction as the "best military regular forces entry." This same outfit has now made the headlines as one of the original two Marine assault companies that landed on the beaches of Da Nang, Vietnam, last March 8th.

Coming to the parade from the U. S. Marine Corps Reserve at Long Beach will be 230 men of the 3rd Air-Naval Gunfire Liaison Company.

George S. Wing, Armed Forces Day general chairman, reminds spectators that the parade will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday, May 15, and will proceed westward on Torrance Boulevard from Cabrillo to Madrona. Grand Marshal Charles T. Hitch, assistant secretary of defense, will lead the parade to the reviewing stand in front of civic center, then assume his position with judges, civic and military dignitaries.
