Vaccination Project

Local District Offers Service

"Be wise—immunize! This slogan is spreading throughout the county as a result of the intensive vaccination project, which is presently under way in Los Angeles County," stated Earl W. Kendrick, M.D., district health officer, Torrance Health District. The Vaccination Assistance Act was passed by Congress in 1962, and the Los Angeles County Health Department applied for and received grant funds made available through this act in June, 1964.

"The goal of the project is to eliminate the preventable diseases by achieving adequate immunization levels in all population groups and in all geographic areas," continued Dr. Kendrick. "Of the preventable diseases, special emphasis is being placed on diphtheria, pertussis (whooping cough) and tetanus (lock-jaw), which can be prevented by a complete series of DPT immunizations; and polio, which can be prevented by the complete series of Sabin or Salk vaccine."

Dr. Kendrick encouraged everyone in the Southwest to participate in the intensive vaccination project by protecting themselves and their families against the preventable diseases through a complete series of immunizations. "Although a special intensive vaccination project staff has been recruited by the Los Angeles County Health Department, the final results will depend on the cooperation and participation of each individual in the community," stated Dr. Kendrick.

IN CONJUNCTION with the intensive vaccination project, the Los Angeles County Health Department is opening evening immunization clinics for pre-schoolers every Thursday from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. at the Torrance Health Center, 2300 W. Carson.

THE NEED for a vaccination project of this type in Los Angeles County is illustrated by the following facts: In Los Angeles County, 50 per cent of the children under the age of five and 80 per cent of the adult population are not fully vaccinated against diphtheria, pertussis, and tetanus; 35 per cent of the children under five are not fully vaccinated against polio. In 1964, there were 25 cases of diphtheria in Los Angeles County, resulting in five deaths. In all cases, the people afflicted were not adequately immunized against diphtheria.

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Law in Action

On the town's outskirts Bill Blue owned some lots with no sidewalks on the main street. On them he built some modern stores, set back so the customers would have a nice ten feet for wide sidewalks and parking.

His neighbor, George Green, later put up some stores too. Like Bill, he set his buildings back for parking.

Six years later, Bill turned his stores into an office building. The city approved his plan to add a few stories and to build out the store front to his old property line. This would narrow the sidewalk.

George next door was horrified. He told Bill that the narrowed sidewalk would block some of the signs on his stores and hurt his business.

Truth is, Bill didn't have the same rights. When Bill first widened his sidewalk for public use, in effect he dedicated his land for public use. He created a public easement by letting the public use the land for more than five years without a break. The public now had gained a right over Bill's land. Bill's blocking of the "easement" had injured George. For this Bill had to pay.

By five year's continued use of another's property, say, for a driveway or for hanging wires or growing shrubbery, the user can claim an "easement." In this case the public can also claim an easement. By allowing its continued use, the landowner in effect "dedicated" his land to the public.

BILL WENT ahead anyhow. And George sued. Bill had created a "nuisance," he claimed. His building blocked the sidewalk and lowered his property value. The court ruled for George. Bill had to pay for the lost value of George's property. How could this be? Wasn't Bill just using his land as he had a right to in the beginning?

Some businesses block off part of their sidewalk one day a year, or rope off the walkway to break the continued use. Other owners may post a sign saying that the "use is permissive only and can be revoked at any time." Every similar situation calls for study for a possible loss of property rights and means to prevent an unwitting loss of such rights.
