

Parnelli's Car Repaired

With Memorial Day overlapping through tomorrow, 33 qualifiers for the 49th running of the Indianapolis 500-Mile Speedway Classic get an extra day with which to tune up their racing machinery.

Parnelli Jones of Torrance, winner of the 1963 Indy, had his Lotus-Ford back on the track yesterday after cracking it up on May 21.

Lloyd Ruby also had his

car in shape after wrecking it a week ago.

Going into yesterday's final test runs, A. J. Foyt held the pole position with the best qualifying time of 161.233 miles per hour.

Apparently out of the race is Roger Ward, former Redondo resident, who was 34th in the qualifying, but has been unable to get into the spectacle as an alternate.



Kemer Brett, a junior, pitching in all four CIF "AA" baseball playoff games, led El Segundo to the championship Friday with a 7-1 win over Loara High School.

The game, played at El Camino College, saw the Eagles win their 19th game in the last 20 starts.

Brett pitched a one-hitter against Loara. On Tuesday he threw a four-hitter against Antelope Valley for a 5-2 win. The week before he beat Hart, 6-2, and Bishop Amat, 10-0.

Brett had a 3-1 record during the Pioneer League campaign. He was restricted on the mound to avoid trouble with the leg he broke in football. His first start on the mound he lost to West High as Dave LaRoche hurled a one-hitter, 5-0 win.

El Segundo closed the league season by winning three games against West, Torrance and Lawndale to finish a game ahead of West in the pennant race. The Eagles had a 12-3 league record.

L.A. Angels In 11-Game Home Stand

Five Indy Racers Built in Torrance

The most successful of the domestic rear engine Indianapolis race cars, the Halibrand Shrike, manufactured in Torrance, will feature a new longer nose style and some suspension modifications for the 1965 classic.

Along with the longer-slimmer nose, the 1965 Shrike will also have a more highly styled engine canopy.

All body sections will be moulded from Fiberglass impregnated with "Missile-Age" ultra-high temperature polyester resin. Heat resistant epoxy based paint is also used throughout the race car.

Ron Pettigrew, senior miler from West High, was fifth in a record-breaking CIF mile race Friday night at Cerritos College.

Pettigrew ran his fastest mile in the time of 4:16.3, but his effort was overshadowed by Carl Trentadue of Westminster High who won the race in 4 minutes, 8.5 seconds.

Trentadue erased the old standard of 4:12.6 set in 1963. Long Beach Poly won the CIF title with 30 points, beating defending champion Muir by 10 points. It was Poly's fifth team championship in history.

500-Lap Stock Car Race Set Tonight

Five hundred gruelling laps of big league late model stock car racing is set for Ascot Park's tough, dirt, half-mile track tonight. A purse of \$10,000 has lured the best of drivers for the classic. It is a Grand National NASCAR event.

The race is set for 7 p.m., with time trials, trophy dash and two heat races set for 2:30 p.m. in the afternoon.

Ascot racing director Johnnie Parsons, who won the 1950 Indianapolis 500, expects a field of more than 33 brand new 1965 Chevies, Fords, Plymouths, Buicks, Mercurys, Pontiacs and other Detroit makes to be on hand, plus 1964 and '63 models.

Danny holds the Ram field goal record of 51 yards and also holds the team punting average record for one game of 52.5 yards.


Villanueva is a native of Tucumcari, N.M., and is a 1960 graduate of New Mexico State College where he made good on seven of eight field goal tries as a college football star.
