

## North Senior Wins Israeli Scholarship

Sheldon Stern, a senior at North High School, has been selected to receive a one-year scholarship to the University of Jerusalem in Israel. Stern is one of 30 U. S. high school seniors throughout the nation named to receive the grant.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Max Stern of 17214 Ardath Ave., Stern received the scholarship through a Jewish youth movement. He was one of 5,000 applicants.

He will receive college credits in Hebrew, political science, literature, and active geography. He hopes to major in chemistry. During the year in Israel, Stern will spend three months on a kibbutz—a cooperative farm.

Stern and the other students will spend three weeks in Europe before returning to the United States.

## El Camino Employee Serves Two Careers

If one were to walk about the El Camino College campus after 10:30 on a weekday evening, he might encounter Ismael M. Garcia, a dignified gentleman, small of stature but a giant in enthusiasm.

Garcia, 3239 W. 188th St., a member of the classified staff of the college at night and a writer by day, has brought reading enjoyment to thousands of people in the United States and Mexico.

The former Mexican Baptist minister has published four books to date. His latest work, "Lecturas Selectas," (Selected Readings) was published recently. Scheduled to appear shortly is a fifth book entitled "Manual Para Festividades Christianas" (Manual For Christian Celebrations).

THOUGH AN eight-hour a day job would be tiring for most 69-year-olds, Garcia writes for a few hours each day after leaving his college work at 6 a.m.

Not one to relax between books, as evidenced by the fact that he has eight more ready to be published, Garcia has also prepared an autobiography.

Garcia started writing while attending Theological Seminary, a college in Mexico City. Because of the revolution of Francisco Villa in 1915, the college was closed and Garcia came to the United States, settling in Kansas City.

After four years in the Midwest, the divinity student journeyed to Los Angeles and enrolled in the Spanish and American Baptist Seminary, from which he graduated in 1927.

For the next 12 years Garcia devoted himself to missionary work in the Republic of El Salvador in Central America. Suffering from a tropical disease, he returned to the United States and assumed ministerial duties of a Baptist church in Santa Bar-

bara. From there he ministered to three Baptist churches before accepting employment at El Camino in 1952.

AN ACHIEVEMENT of which Garcia is especially proud, is his receipt of an associate in arts degree in 1958 at the college.

Since starting to write in 1915, Garcia has continually collected material for his books. Most of his works contain information from his own experiences and translations of poems and stories from English into Spanish.

Garcia's first book, "Notas de Mi Laud," (Notes On My Flute) appeared in 1943, followed by "Bosquejos de Sermones" (Outlines of Sermons) in 1952 and "Estudios Biblicos" (Biblical Studies) in 1954.

Area Teacher Takes UCLA Assignment

El Camino College history instructor Judson A. Grenier will be a visiting professor of history on the Campus of the University of California at Los Angeles next year.


