(Continued from Page A-2) overall rate at \$1,238 per \$100 assessed valuation. Councilmen received the budget without comment and scheduled work sessions for next week. The sessions, to be held Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday afternoons at 4, will be in the council chambers. They are open to the public.

IN OTHER matters, the council:

- Rejected a bid of \$49,370 submitted by P. I. Hadden Jr. for the 1965-66 weed abatement program and ordered the project re-advertised. Only one bid was received and it was 33 per cent higher than the 1964-65 bid.

- Approved plans and specifications for additions to the city's police department and authorized the city manager to advertise for construction bids. Estimated cost of the project is \$314,600.

- Tabled to July 13 discussion of a Library Commission recommendation which would permit residents of the City of Los Angeles to use the Torrance Library free. Under a county library directive, Los Angeles residents must pay a \$5 annual fee.

- Authorized payroll deductions for members of Torrance City Employees Association to pay monthly dues.

- Authorized parks superintendent C. W. Clemmer to attend the International Shade Tree Conference in Santa Barbara, June 20 through 23.

- Approved purchase of a color television set to be used at the Adult Center for a senior citizens recreation program. The television set will cost \$609.44.

(Continued from Page A-2) 17 meeting cautioned that the only issue was the expenditure of tax monies to purchase the records.

"If you wish to voice your concern, remember, the contents of these records are not at issue," the leaflet cautioned.

The content of the records was, however, very much at issue during Monday's debate.

PARENTS have charged the records hypnotize small children and are designed to "jangle the nervous system." They demanded that the use of the records be suspended until definite action is taken—a demand which the board refused to meet.

Dr. Hull said the county counsel, which serves as the legal advisor to the local board, had promised to research the problem as quickly as possible.

Trustees Bert M. Lynn and Dr. Kurt Shery, as well as Mrs. Watts, said they had listened to the recordings along with others and could find nothing subversive in the recordings. Dr. Shery did say one of the recordings was, in his opinion, in bad taste.

"I've seen worse on television," Lynn said.

THE BOARD voted to defer action until the June 21 meeting and instructed Dr. Hull to use the telephone or any other means necessary to secure adequate information by that date. William J. Hanson and Dr. Shery cast the two dissenting votes.

After the vote was recorded, Mrs. Lee rose to ask, "What are we to do while you guys investigate?"

"I can't answer that question," Mrs. Watts said. She then suggested Mrs. Lee might consult legal counsel or ask Dr. Hull to consult the county counsel.
