The group, first organized 23 years ago, is a project of the St. John's Mission, which is home for some 400 Indian youths. The school is operated through donations.

Six boys will make up the group to appear in Torrance. They are full blooded Indians of the Apache, Pima, Navajo, and Papago tribes. The group will tour California throughout June and July.

DANCERS MAKE their own costumes out of buckskin, wild turkey and eagle feathers. Drums also are made of deerskin.
