

Two Trips Slated for Explorers

Two Conservation Camps and a Region X canoe trip are open to the Explorers this summer. Explorers are teenage members of the Boy Scouts of America.

Two one-week Explorer Conservation Camps will be held at the Rotary Village area of the Lake Arrowhead Camps, August 21-28 and Aug. 28-Sept. 4. Cost is \$15 per week.

Conservation Camp is a work camp designed to complete many conservation projects to help the camp, while at the same time building muscles in Explorers.

THE PROGRAM also includes many chances to enjoy the many program features of the Arrowhead Camps.

A second Explorer camping experience limited to 10 Explorers is a two-week trip to Region X Canoe base at Ely, Minn. The crew will leave Los Angeles on Aug. 12 and return Aug. 30. Ten days will be spent in canoes in the wilderness country of Minnesota and Canada.

The group will be under experienced leadership of Ray Sutliff, district executive of El Rio San Antonio.

Los Angeles Schools Start Summer Program

Summer school programs ranging from the basic 3 R's to advanced individual science experimentation will get under way tomorrow for more than 110,000 students in the Los Angeles City Schools.

The widely varied program will cost \$6,181,357 and will be held in 136 schools, according to Superintendent of Schools Jack P. Crowther.

Local Jewish School Names New Teacher

New officers and the appointment of a teacher for next year have been announced by the South Bay Jewish Heritage School, formerly Kinderhsule.

New president of the cooperative, non-profit school, which teaches Jewish history and culture to children from 6 to 12, is Murray A. Luftglass. He is a chemical engineer for Shell Chemical Co. and lives in Palos Verdes with his wife and four children.

DIRECTING studies for the new year will be Mrs. J. Paul Spector, a certified teacher, music specialist and nursery school instructor, now teaching at Temple Sinai in Los Angeles. Mrs. Spector formerly taught at Temple Menorah in Redondo Beach.

THE NEW BOARD of directors includes, Mrs. W. Bergman, vice president and principal; Mrs. Louis Fredhandler, recording secretary; Mrs. Allan Sholl, corresponding secretary; Mrs. Sherman Lebo, registrar; and Mrs. Herbert Honor, curriculum chairman.

Dr. Louis Fredhandler is outgoing president of the school, which is accepting applications for the fall term.

The regular summer school program, approved by the Los Angeles City Board of Education last March, will be held in 30 senior high schools, seven junior colleges, eight adult schools, and on a limited basis for ninth graders at 20 junior highs.

About 95,000 students are expected to enroll for this portion of the summer program. It will cost \$2,783,098.

IN ADDITION, approximately 16,000 students will participate in a wide variety of projects funded by a grant from the federal Economic Opportunity Act. The program will cost \$3,398,259, of which \$2,662,386 is federal funds.

Two main programs financed with poverty funds will be held at the elementary school level, involving approximately 11,700 youngsters.

Head start classes will be conducted at 60 schools for children four years and seven months or older who will be entering kindergarten or first grade for the first time in September.

IN THE HARBOR area, operation head start classes will be conducted at Park West, Barton Hill, Hawaiian Avenue, Normont Avenue, Bandini, and 122nd schools.

Special ninth grade reading classes will be held at Stephen M. White Junior High School, while Gardena High School will conduct a regular summer school program. Harbor Junior College also will operate a regular summer program.

Summer study centers will be held at 28 elementary schools, including Hawaiian Avenue School, for 8,300 students. Science laboratories, field trips, instrumental music, reading, language clinics, arithmetic, art, and library participation classes are planned at the centers.
