

ECC to Display Air Force Defense Missiles

A huge Air Force IM-99 "Bomarc" air defense missile will be on display at El Camino College, in conjunction with the Lawndale Community Fair, today through July 5.

Manufactured by Boeing, the Bomarc is a long range, extremely high altitude weapon designed to intercept and destroy enemy aircraft or missiles before they can reach their targets in this country.

Used in conjunction with our SAGE air defense system, the Bomarc is guided from a ground launch point to the interception area. From that point it takes over its guidance, seeking out and destroying a target anywhere within 250 miles of its takeoff point.

Effectiveness of the Bomarc has been repeatedly proven during test flights in which it destroyed remote-controlled target aircraft and supersonic missiles under conditions closely simulating those of actual combat conditions.

THE MISSILE on display will be one which has been specifically modified for public viewing. Mounted on a flatbed trailer, it is transported in a horizontal position when traveling over highways.

Approximately 50 feet long, the missile has a wingspan of 18 feet. It is capable of supersonic speeds and very high altitude operation. Launching power is supplied by booster rockets which blast the missile from the ground to altitude, where two ramjet engines take over and supply power for speed.

Assembly Stops Clock To Complete 1965 Work

The 1965 regular session of the California State Legislature began at noon on Monday, January 4, 1965, and theory ended at midnight Friday, June 18, 1965. The electric clock in the Assembly Chambers was stopped twice by turning off the current and twice it was started by turning the current on.

Newspaper photographers photographed the official clock several times with great glee, just to achieve realistic reporting, but the Honorable Jesse M. Unruh, Speaker of the Assembly, insisted that he would let us know when midnight arrived because he knew what time it was. Everyone else insisted that it was at least 12:40 a.m. on the morning of Tuesday, June 19, 1965, when we adjourned. The only importance to this matter is that there is

some question about the legality of bills passed by the Assembly after midnight on the last day of a session.

When the regular session ended a budget was passed by both the Assembly and the Senate to the Governor, but the reapportionment of the State Senate was unresolved and came to nothing. It is a matter of record that neither the Assembly nor the Senate voted favorably on the various reapportionment bills coming from one house to the other. The reason is simple. All of the 40 gentlemen in our State Senate want to remain State Senators and all but three Members of the Assembly have been working feverishly to become State Senators.

THE THREE Members of the Assembly who have not been working feverishly to become State Senators are

the Honorable Jesse Marvin Unruh, Speaker of the Assembly; Mrs. Pauline Davis and I, Assemblyman Unruh must be re-elected as Member of the Assembly or he cannot remain Speaker of the Assembly. Also, Jesse would like to be elected Governor of California in 1966. So would the incumbent Governor, Edmund P. "Pat" Brown, hence Jesse has some built-in competition.

Mrs. Pauline Davis has not made any announcement but she has good sense and realizes that there is no logic in actively campaigning for election from a senatorial district which does not even exist.

AT THIS POINT it may be well to pound out the obvious by carefully explaining that in order to create a reapportioned State Senate there must be a law passed

by both the Assembly and the Senate, signed by the Governor and filed with the Secretary of State, Frank M. Jordan. Even if this is done, California is in the clutches of the United States Supreme Court and various other United States Courts and the federal magistrates thereof.

If these federal courts and judges do not like any reapportionment law enacted by the California State Legislature, they can say it is in violation of the United States Constitution and throw it out the window. Therefore, from my viewpoint it is futile to campaign for election from a senatorial district of uncertain boundaries and doubtful legality even if and when the boundaries are drawn by human hands, federal or state.

AS A MEMBER of the Assembly Committee on Revenue and Taxation, I voted

against increasing existing taxes and against levying new taxes. As a member of the Assembly Committee on Transportation and Commerce, I voted against several bills which on their face were not tax bills but had taxes disguised as fees written into them. I voted on the floor of the Assembly against all bills increasing existing taxes or imposing new taxes, directly or indirectly.

It is difficult to explain in a few words, but in spite of the utmost diligence on the part of very objective newspaper reporters who were present at the committee hearings and present on the floor of the Assembly, it is impossible for such reporters to reach the readers of the newspapers with the full that they can "elect and spend." May God save the newspaper reporters and the deadlines to meet, and the State of California from its enemies within and without!

SEVERAL BILLS which passed through both houses of the Legislature during the past regular session were "package" or "omnibus" bills containing several different bills tied together. Those which contained direct or indirect taxes tied in under a noble heading received my vigorous opposition and "NO" votes.

It is a historical fact that whenever money is voted by the California Legislature or the Congress of the United States, it is spent and there comes a new demand for higher old taxes and many new taxes to feed the hungry mouths of those who believe that they can "elect and spend." May God save the newspaper reporters and the deadlines to meet, and the State of California from its enemies within and without!
