Shrine-Hi Quarterback Joins Dodgers Instead

For the first time in history of the Shrine North-South football game, a team coach will not have at least one of his own high school stars on the squad.

Paul Briggs of Bakersfield, co-coach with Joe Kelly (Eagle Rock) of the South aggregation, lost his own quarterback, John Wyatt, who signed a reported \$50,000 bonus contract with the Dodgers.

The 25-man North squad, coached by George Davis (St. Helena) and Collie Kidwell (Mountain View) hail from different high schools. On the

South crew, only Loyola and Long Beach Poly landed two men each.

RAM ROOKIE CAMP

Five Candidates Get 2nd Chance

Five young players who have had pro tryouts in previous years with the Rams or another NFL club will receive a "second chance" at the club's 1965 rookie training camp, which opens at Chapman College in Orange on July 11.

Linemen Tim Powell, Bob Oetting and Roger Pillath, all of whom made strong Ram bids in '64, will return after an autumn of seasoning with the Canton Bulldogs of the United League.

Jerry Burton, promising defensive backfield candidate from Northwestern (La.) State and a ninth-round choice in the 1964 draft, decided to return home and pursue a coaching career. He'll be back this summer to give it another try.

Another making a second grab for the brass ring is Oregon's H. D. Murphy, a de-

fensive back who tried with Dallas last year.

In a slightly different category is Lou Cordileone, making his second training camp appearance as a Ram candidate.

Cordileone has played with the Giants, the 49ers and the Steelers as well as the Rams, but always as an offensive guard or as a defensive lineman. However, with Cordileone's speed and agility, Ram coaches feel that he may well have been miscast in earlier trials. So it'll be "linebacker" Lou Cordileone this year.

Doyle Wood Is Rifle Instructor

Doyle Wood of 4873 Hallison St. has been appointed a certified rifle and shotgun instructor, by the National Rifle Association of America.

The new instructor passed a series of tests and served a prescribed period of time in training activities before receiving certification. He is now qualified to conduct local classes in firearms operation, safe gun-handling, and the techniques of shooting on the target range and in the field.

Wood joins the rank of selected personnel maintained by the NRA throughout the country in its small arms education program. The program has been in operation since 1876; since that time many millions of people have been taught to handle and enjoy firearms safely.

Grunion End Four-Day Invasion of Beaches

That special breed of Southland beachcombers, the grunion hunters, wind up four nights searching for the elusive little fish tonight.

A four-night spawning run began Thursday night, according to the Department of Fish and Game.

Runs lasting about an hour each are expected to conclude at 2:45 a.m. in the morning.

Any of the quiet, sandy ocean beaches between Morro Bay and Baja California is a good prospect for a grunion run, the DFG observed. Veteran grunion hunters know the little silversides may not run on every beach or on every night they are expected to, or may even show up at a time when they are not expected.

Perseverance, sharp eyes, fortitude and just plain luck often pay off, though, and many a grunion seeker who remained on the beach after everyone else had given up has been rewarded by a late run and the makings of a delicious meal. Grunion are tasty morsels when seared and fried to a golden brown.

Grunion may be taken on the beach or in the surf by hand only. No device of any kind may be used, and it is unlawful to dig holes in the sand to trap the fish. Anyone 16 years old or over must have a valid California sport-fishing license.

There is no bag limit on grunion, the DFG said, but in the interest of conserva-

tion, don't take more than needed.

Captain Dick Shaver of the boat, Liberty, out of Pierpoint Landing, reported back from a trip to the Cortes Bank with 50 passengers landing 53 big yellowtail.

More than 200 hook-ups were recorded on this trip and those brought to gaff weighed from 20 to 49 pounds each.


Pierpoint has scheduled two boats a week to the Cortes, home of the big black sea bass.

The freelance boat, America, is reporting limits of barracuda and bass. This boat is fishing the area south between the mainland and San Clemente Island.

The boats fishing Catalina are reporting better action on the log barracuda. The boat, Freedom, returned from the island last Thursday with 125 scooters included in their catch.

Locally, everyday has brought limits of bass on the half-day boat. Both morning and afternoon trips are finding anglers scoring heavy on these fish along with bonito.

Breakwater fishermen, using skiffs from the Pierpoint small boat rental, have found the halibut action cooled off. However, they are getting excellent catches of perch and opalaye. The area near the Long Beach Gap of the federal breakwater seems to be yielding the biggest catches.
