CDA Independence Day Mass

Expressing their love for God and Country, approximately 75 junior and senior Catholic Daughters of America from the South Bay area are attending the twelfth annual Independence Day Mass celebrated in St. Vibiana Cathedral, Los Angeles, this morning at 9 o'clock.

Officers and members of Court St. Catherine, Torrance, Our Lady of Victory, Redondo and Madonna of the Hills, Rolling Hills and Palos Verdes Estates will join the other 53 courts of the Los Angeles Archdiocese to pray for the welfare of this country on the anniversary of its independence.

His Eminence James Francis Cardinal McIntyre will preside with Rev. Ernest Gualderon, Catholic Daughter State Chaplain, the celebrant. The sermon will be delivered by Rev. Frank Wagner, O.M.I., of Alemany High School, San Fernando. Solemn

High Mass will be sung by the San Gabriel Mission Choir.

The color guard will be formed by 40 flag bearing members of the Los Angeles Diocese Past Grand Regents Club, who will line the entire center aisle of the Cathedral as the officers of each court, wearing the colorful robes of their respective offices, led by Mrs. Paul Haberstroh, state regent, file in.

Joining the senior members of the three local courts will be the Juniors of Ct. St. Catherine and Ct. Our Lady of Victory. They will also be in uniform and each will carry a small American flag.

At the conclusion of the Mass the entire congregation, 1000 voices strong, will join the singing of the National Anthem and a silent prayer of thanks for the privilege of being an American.
