

# Harvey Develops Speed

The Harvey Aluminum Hustler, the jet speedboat that crashed last year at a speed of 300 mph during a test run, has been repaired and is ready to go back into the water.

Lee Taylor, 31, who piloted the jet powered hydroplane when it crashed on the Colorado River, is making an extraordinary recovery from the accident and plans to run the Hustler again within the next few months.

Speed sites for the boat are being checked out now by the company's racing division. Challenged will be Donald Campbell's world

mark on water of 276.34 mph, set the final day of last year in Australia.

For the attempt to better Campbell's land record of 403.1 mph, Harvey Aluminum is furnishing all of the aluminum structural materials, wheels, and skin for the Goldenrod, a four-engine car being built by Bob and Bill Summers of Ontario, California.

The Chrysler Hemi V-8 engines in the Goldenrod are mounted in-line and coupled in pairs, and Bob Summers expects to drive the car late this summer on the Bonneville Salt Flats at a speed ap-

proaching 500 mph. Also participating in the speed project are Firestone, Hurst, and Mobil—companies with historic racing backgrounds.

Aiming at Britisher Donald Campbell's records goes beyond patriotic duty for the aluminum producer.

"Racing is a practical research laboratory for engineering and metallurgical advancements in aluminum and in other light metals," says Lawrence A. Harvey, president of Harvey Aluminum.

"Through competition testing, we are able to accelerate the development of new products to make tomorrow's

## Quarterbacks, Centers To Train with Rookies

Six Ram veterans will get a two-week jump on their teammates when they start training with a 45-man rookie contingent today.

While most of the veterans will not report to Chapman College in Orange until July 25, quarterbacks Roman Gabriel and Bill Munson, centers Ken Iman and Joe Wendryhoski, halfback Terry Baker and linebacker Lou Cordileone will rush into drills with the freshmen.

"It's always of value, physically and mentally, for the quarterbacks to get an early start on pre-season activity," said head coach Harland Svare. "We also plan to have our quarterbacks call their own plays, and this extra time to prepare field generalship will be helpful to them," the coach added.

Iman and Wendryhoski both have claims on the center position. Iman was scheduled to be the starting center last year, but sustained a pre-season ankle fracture and had to retire for the year. Wendryhoski, affectionately dubbed "Joe Alphabet" by teammate Dick Bass, stepped into Iman's spot and played

## Course Given In Safety

A two-week hunter safety course for youngsters will begin tomorrow at the North American Los Angeles Division Recreation Center.

The school satisfies state law requiring that any person under 18 seeking a hunting license for the first time must pass a course in the safe handling of firearms.

The minimum age for the course is 11-years-old.

James E. Driskell, hunter safety instructor for the Inglewood area, stated that registration will be from 5:45 p.m. to 6:45 p.m. in the auditorium on the recreation center grounds located on Imperial Hwy. and Judah Street in Los Angeles.

Certificates of completion will be awarded to those who attend all four sessions and pass the examination. Classes will be held 7 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. on July 15-19-22-28.

As in past years, students are instructed in firearm safety, care of their weapons, hunter responsibility, and sportsmanship.

Students are asked not to bring their firearms to class. There will be, however, an opportunity to fire on Range Night at the company's Rifle and Pistol range.

The instructors, all certified by the National Rifle Assn. for hunter safety courses, are Driskell, Frank T aylor and Allan Purcell.

## PRICE OF ADMISSION ADJUSTED FOR ASCOT

A new low-price admission goes into effect immediately for all motor racing events at Ascot Park, it was announced today by Ascot president Harry Schooler.

A top price of \$2.50 for all regular events will prevail from now on, according to Schooler, with \$3.50 charged for all special national championship races, or double-header events.

In addition, Schooler said all Wednesday night Figure 8 stock car races will be "Bonus Nights" for the rest of the season. Holders of ticket stubs to previous Ascot events will be admitted for half-price, \$1.25.

Since auto racing is the most dangerous of all sports, and requires a large individual expense to car owners as well as a huge maintenance and insurance outlay for the track, the price scale has been adjusted to operating costs.

Ascot's racing schedule includes the regular Wednesday and Sunday evening Figure 8 races, flat track motorcycles every Friday night, and varied Saturday night events for USAC Offenhauser mid-gets, TT motorcycles, CRA sprint cars and FIA Grand Prix cars and FIA sedans.

## Gold Cup Purse Tops \$162,000

The \$162,100 Hollywood Gold Cup, internationally renowned as the "Race of Champions" and one of the turf's most coveted prizes, will be presented for the 26th time Saturday at Hollywood Park in Inglewood.

The mile and one-quarter classic, first of the nation's big races to guarantee the winner \$100,000 net, is the highlight of Hollywood Park's stakes program.

The honor roll of victors in the Hollywood Gold Cup resembles a "Who's Who" of the turf and Saturday's field promises to be no exception as a brilliant lineup of handicap stars is slated to parade postward.

Heading the field will be the remarkable Native Diver, winner of a record 21 stakes races in California, including the \$53,300 Los Angeles and \$53,750 American Handicaps this season.

The flashy Imbros gelding, rapidly approaching the \$500,000 mark in earnings, equaled the world's record of 1:20 flat in the seven-furlong Los Angeles and in his last start scored a brilliant triumph in typical wire-to-wire fashion in the mile and one-eighth American Handicap.

Among Native Diver's likely rivals are such formidable campaigners as Hill Rise, winner of the Santa Anita Handicap last winter and "Horse of the Meeting" at the Arcadia oval; the Argentine-bred Tronado, victor in the \$54,800 Inglewood Handicap and runner-up in the American Handicap, and Colorado King, defending Hollywood Gold Cup champion.

Other prospects include distance-loving Babington, a stablemate of Tronado and also Argentine-bred; Royal Eiffel, a multiple winner at the meeting and a "dark horse" threat, and Jalouse II, another Argentine invader who through her triumphs in the \$28,550 Wishire and \$54,050 Vanity Handicaps is the filly and mare Hollywood champion this season.


