

## 'Five Play Festival' Scheduled

The North High Summer Theater Group will stage its first "Five Play Festival," a program of five brief one-act plays, Thursday, July 22, at North High.

The plays will be staged in a "Horseshoe Theater," a variation of theater-in-the-round. Curtain time is 7:30 p.m.

The plays, three comedies and two mysteries, are being produced and directed by crews under the supervision of Gerald P. Pendrick, the Group's director.

**"BOY MEETS FAMILY,"** the first of the five plays, is directed by Joan Capucci. Tim Doty stars as Lancelot, the nervous young fiance of Polly Wombly, portrayed by Jeannie Barton. Richard Young, Claudia Weaver, Sandra Frederick, and Ray Knapp portray the Wombly family which Doty must face for the first time.

Judy Jackson directs "Tiger Lily," a murder-mystery. Christy Gilson and Mark Lester are featured as Lily and Quinny. Their intended victims are portrayed by Patrick Shea and Sherylyn Schnider. Frank Damiano is featured.

The second comedy on the program, "Let's Make Up," takes a look at the vain habits of teenage girls. Maryann Gerisch and Sheri Martellaro are seen as Jean and Marilyn, while Rich Nissen and Terry Gilbert play Johnny and Dick. Patrons of the motel which is the setting include Ron Updike, Cathy Yancey, Judy Jackson, Cherie Rummel and John Pattison, with Randy Whalen as the bellboy. Cathy Yancey directs the play.

**"THE RECEIVERS,"** a drama that offers both subtle humor and a moral, is directed by Sharon Carlson. Ron Frederick plays "Phil the Mink," a gentleman burglar who teaches Flora and Amos Little, played by Bliss Jenkins and Michael Waterman, a valuable lesson in trusting each other.

"Why I Am A Bachelor," starring Mike Newman as a world traveler and expert lecturer on women, is directed by Mary Tierney. Debbie Jonas, Buddy Hanson, Polly Laird, Joann Ducommun, and Susie Kamins give just the touch to bring down the curtain on an entertaining evening.

The five plays will be performed only once. Tickets for the two-hour show are 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for students.
