

Harbor General Plans Day Refresher Course

The fourth in a series of "refresher nursing courses" instruction at the hospital, will begin tomorrow at Harbor General Hospital.

The six-week course, featuring training in the hospital's intensive care units, will be held Mondays through Fridays from 8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Sponsored by the California State Employment Service in conjunction with Harbor College, which will conduct the program's classroom instruction at the hospital, the first three courses were scheduled at night.

The switch to daylight is due to availability of facilities during "in between summer weeks" of the regular college training class programs at the hospital.

Designed to attract some of California's 20,000 unemployed nurses back to work to relieve the nursing shortage, the courses will be continued at other facilities, according to Robert Lambert of the Employment Service.

The program is financed under the Federal Manpower Development Training Act and is tuition free. Trainees may receive transportation allowances and a maximum of \$75 in weekly benefits.

Nurses, or persons eligible for a California nursing license, who are interested in

At Riviera School Frequent Changes of Principals Protested

A letter signed by nearly 400 Riviera area parents protesting the transfer of Robert Allen from Riviera School to the school district's administrative staff was handed to the Board of Education Monday evening.

Mrs. Donna Feltnagle, who read the letter to the board, said the letter in no way was a reflection on the new principal at Riviera School.

Allen was named acting curriculum consultant to replace Mrs. Margaret Collin, who is on sabbatical leave. Richard Brown, former Yukon principal, will replace Allen at Riviera School.

PARENTS SAID they resented the "frequent changes of principals" at the school. Brown is the fifth principal to serve at Riviera School in the past 10 years.

Changes disrupt both the continuity and communications of the school, the letter said. Mrs. Feltnagle called the frequent changes a "diservice to the school."

Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of schools, told the parents he agreed with their points, but added he did not transfer principals without careful consideration.

"Your area requires a high level of service and you need outstanding principals," Dr. Hull said, "and everytime we assign a principal someone else hires him or we need him for another job."

DR. HULL SAID he preferred to have a man on the way up as a principal. "It is always a disservice (to the school) when we transfer a principal, and always an asset to the district," he said.

The superintendent said he had transferred eight principals this year in an effort to fit the man to the needs of the particular school. Every effort, Dr. Hull said, is made to avoid unnecessary changes in the principal assignments.

Parents emphasized their letter was not based on emotional or personal feelings. "We just wanted our opinion to be heard," one father said.

Dog Vaccination Set Thursday by County

Local participation in the county's annual mass dog vaccination campaign Thursday will be held at Farmer's Outlet Market, 1820 E. Carson from 7 to 8:30 p.m., according to Dr. G. A. Heidebreder, Los Angeles County chief deputy health officer.

This large scale rabies prevention measure is being jointly sponsored by county health and city animal regulation departments together with the Southern California Veterinary Medical Association. Hundreds of community volunteers from various organizations will lend their efforts to this all-out attempt to provide all pet owners the opportunity of conveniently and inexpensively protecting their dogs against rabies.

"Everyone owning a dog in Los Angeles is required by state and local law to keep his animal up to date in its protection against rabies," Dr. Heidebreder said. "Vaccines used at these clinics is good for two years and is offered at the cost price of supplies and processing—\$1.50 each."

DOG LICENSES, too, will be available from inspectors from the animal regulation department who will be present at each clinic.

Veterinarian members of the veterinary medical association will be donating their services to these clinics, as in the past years.

Vaccinations will be given to all dogs over the age of four months, but only to dogs, Dr. Heidebreder said. No cats, monkeys, skunks or other pets will be vaccinated.

Leashes should be brought on leashes by adults who know the breed and approximate weight of the animals for identification information, he said.

Realty Board Launches Property Owners Drive

The Torrance-Lomita Board of Realtors has launched a campaign to inform home owners and other property owners about legislation pending or being talked about which will affect them directly, Albert Z. England said today.

"This will be done through the newly formed Property Owners Division of the California Real Estate Association," England said. "It is open to real property owners and others as 'subscribers' for an annual \$3 fee."

He commented that "too often the property owner learns of the impact of a new tax measure or a housing bill only after it has been passed by the Congress or the State Legislature. The CREA Property Owners Division is intended to alert subscribers early."

He said the information would be sent in the form of bulletins, or even public meetings if that seems called for. "The association will recommend action when the property owner's welfare seems threatened," he added.

Information folders and application blanks for subscribing to the new division are now available at the headquarters of Torrance-Lomita Board or from board members, England said.
