Playing tonight at Ryan Field in a lower bracket of the double elimination tournament are Pacific-Riviera and Central Torrance. The winner comes back tomorrow night to play West Torrance.

The district tournament continues through Sunday. Each of the six teams remains in the tournament until all teams except one has lost two games.

Rolling Hills Little League, a finalist in District 26 playoffs the past three years, was off and rolling again yesterday with a 17-0 win over helpless Sunset at Southwood Field.

Pacific Little League won its second tournament game against Eastview, 5-1, at Torondo and earned the right to meet Rolling Hills tomorrow in a semi-final district game at Torondo.

Tonight's semi-final opponents are Southwood and Central Redondo who clash at the Southwood field.

Central Redondo blanked Palos Verdes, 5-0, and Lunada Bay, 7-0, for the right to meet Southwood. The host league had a first round bye, and defeated Silver Spur, 8-0, in its only outing.

Southwood and Rolling Hills have been tabbed the most likely finalists for Saturday's championship tilt at Torondo at 3:30 p.m., but Rolling Hills will get a tough test tomorrow from Pacific pitcher Jeff Holly.

Holly got his second home run of the tournament in beating Eastview. Lee Roy Leech hurled the win, giving up a first pitch homer to Doug Pryor for a lone run.

Southwood broke into District 26 playoffs with a 7-0 shutout over Silver Spur and Central Redondo whitewashed its second opponent, Lunada Bay, 8-0.

Steve Brown, who homered twice for Central Redondo last Friday, came back with three hits against Lunada Bay and threw a 13-strikeout one-hitter against his opponent.

Southwood's Mark Kroner threw a one-hitter at Silver Spur, striking out 13 batters. It was the victor's first outing.

Southwood and Central Redondo meet in a semi-final game at Southwood tonight at 5:30 in a semi-final game.

Eastview Little League won a tournament game for the first time Saturday by blanking North Redondo, 2-0, in the first game of a double-header at Torondo.

In the second game defending District 26 champion Torondo was beaten by Pacific, 8-2. Jeff Holly homered in the win. He was also the winning pitcher with 15 strikeouts.

Tonight's opponents are North Torrance East and Victoria Park at 5:30. Tomorrow Torrance American and Lomita tangle at the same time and place.

The district championship game will be Saturday at 1 p.m. at Torondo Field. It will be part of a doubleheader with the District 26 decider taking place at 3:30 p.m.

Three of the four semi-finalists in District 27 advanced with one game under their belts. North Torrance East dumped its rival North Torrance West, 8-3; Torrance American blanked Torrance National, 7-0; and Lomita edged Pacific Coast, 3-1, last night.

Victoria Park has won two games, defeating Dominguez, 1-0, in 10 innings, and Carson, 3-2.

North Torrance East and Torrance American, both strong in the line of pitching, hitting, and size, are favored to battle in the district final.

Lomita's Mark Pettit, son of Paul Pettit, and John Peters both got two hits in their team's 3-1 win over Pacific Coast a previous 7-1 winner over Fre-Way.

Victoria Park went 10 innings to beat Dominguez, 1-0, at Carson Field. Torrance American blanked Torrance National, 7-0, at Fre-Way Field.

Victoria Park, which edged Carson 3-2 last Thursday, got one-hit relief pitching from Manuel Dominguez to beat Dominguez Little League. Manuel came into the game in the fifth after Charley Talez loaded the bases with no outs.

Tim Guy hit two home runs and pitcher Steve Johnson had one for the victors. Johnson spun 13 strikeouts.

In the day's second District 27 game at Carson Pacific Coast League of Torrance bested Fre-Way, 7-1. Bill Danaszynski and Robbie Andrews belted homers.

Torrance Red Devils Win Third Pennant

The Torrance Red Devils won the South Bay Connie Mack League championship for the third straight year by defeating Westchester Saturday, 5-0, at Torrance Park.

Torrance High pitcher Steve Kealey hurled the win, striking out 17 batters. He allowed three hits.

The Red Devils, who finished with a 12-2 record, bested Beach Cities (11-3) for the pennant. The defending national Connie Mack champion Torrence Bullets were third with a 10-4 mark.

A sectional tournament commencing Monday at Blair Field in Long Beach will launch the 1965 double elimination tournament. Torrance and Beach Cities meet in the first round game at 6 p.m.

Back on June 19 life looked gloomy for Red Devils who had lost their third game against two victories to Long Beach, 3-2. The Bullets, West L.A. and Beach Cities headed the pack with 4-1 records.

Subsequently the Red Devils lost several players, including Al Thompson and Nick Van Lue who turned pro. Added to the roster were Fred Myers, Chick James and Johnny Bill Rose. The Red Devils started a win streak that has extended to 10

games and includes a reversal of the 3-2 loss to Long Beach via forfeit.

Inasmuch as Connie Mack teams are drawn from five high schools and a reshuffling of schools is permitted for the playoffs, Manager Bob Palica of the Red Devils has dropped Palos Verdes High and replaced it with Gardena.

The lone representative of the team from Palos Verdes was Rose whose employment prevents him from continuing with the Red Devils during the playoffs.

By picking up Gardena, the Red Devils gain Hoggy Wong and Jack Crist who were with the Bullets for the national

pickups is Gardena pitcher Barry Kubishta.

Members of the Red Devils who have been with the team throughout the year are Steve Kealey, Ray Allen, Jim Kegley, Bob Sharpe, Randy Humphrey, Cubby Muse, Dick White, Charlie Beech, Dennis Timpe, Larry Snyder, and John Savidan.

Jim Rucker, manager of Beach Cities, has obtained the services of Bullet manager Bob Pryor for his coach during the playoffs.

In preparation for the playoffs the Red Devils will meet

an all-star team from the South Bay League Saturday at 8 p.m. at Torrance Park.

Besides beating Westchester last Saturday, the Red Devils came back Sunday for a 6-3 win over Long Beach in a no-contest match.

The Bullets, meanwhile, were knocked out of the playoffs with a 9-1 loss to West Los Angeles.
