Scouts to Ring Bells for Show

Boy Scouts will continue ringing doorbells each week-end until May 21 in an effort to sell 100,000 tickets to the Scout-O-Rama '66.

The doorbell campaign is being staged by Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, and Explorers from throughout the Southwest area, according to Bryan Hardwick, Peninsula advertising executive and Scout-O-Rama chairman.

The event, to be held at El Camino College, will feature six family shows for the price of one, Hardwick said. Tickets are priced at \$1 each.

IN ADDITION to more than 600 booths for the display of Scouting skills, crafts, and Explorer specialties, there will be five other shows, program chairman Jim Farrell explained.

Included will be an Indian Village featuring dances and crafts of the early Americans, an aqua pool with water sports and canoeing, a little theater featuring continuous productions of magic shows, bands, and skits, and a challenge arena where Scout troops will challenge each other to friendly competition.

A pioneering area where large structures such as monkey bridges and signal towers will be constructed by Scout troops also will be featured.

of the El Camino College show will be an aerospace display, donated by several space firms in the area.

Each \$1 ticket which a Cub Scout, Boy Scout, or Explorer sells entitles him to a "Scout Buck" redeemable for Scouting equipment, summer camp, or Boys' Life magazine. His troop, pack, or post also receives up to 25 per cent commission on each ticket.

All other proceeds after show expenses will be used to support Scouting in the Los Angeles Area Council, particularly summer camps and Scouting in the lower income areas of the city.

"THE WHOLE family from junior to grandma will enjoy the SCOUT-O-RAMA," according to Hardwick. "It's really a pleasure to see how hard these young people and their leaders are working to put on a show with appeal and interest for everyone," he said.

A few of the displays include kayak-building, pancake flipping, burro riding, first aid, fly and bait casting, archery, finger-printing, and photography — and the audience will be invited to participate.

The Scout-O-Rama opens at 2 p.m. and will close at 10 p.m. May 21.

LSD Measure May Hit Snag in New Hearings

District Attorney Evelle J. Younger today urged increased pressure for a measure to control LSD and similar hallucination producing drugs, charging they "are getting into the hands of youngsters."

Despite widespread public support, the bill — SB 6 — appears to be running into resistance in Sacramento, Younger said. Backers in addition to Younger, include the Attorney General, the District Attorney's Association of California and the State Peace Officers Association.

The measure will come before the Assembly Criminal Procedure Committee this week. It already has passed the Senate. Young said he is concerned, however, because of reports that forces against imposing more restrictions on the sale and distribution of hallucinogenic agents are preparing a massive assault.

"THIS IS one of the most important, if not the most important of the matters currently engaging the attention of the State Legislature," he said. "It is 'must' legislation. Law enforcement has been gathering evidence in ever-increasing proportions pointing up the fact that these drugs are being widely used by persons indifferent to or ignorant of the tremendous dangers involved."

Younger said he particularly meant to include juveniles "We find," he reported, "that these substances are getting into the hands of the youngsters. And all the leading medical authorities on the subject are in agreement that because of the lack of knowledge of the properties of this drug, it should be confined to a strictly-controlled experimental environment."

STATE SENATOR Donald Grunsky (R-Watsonville)

warned earlier this week that opposition to SB 6 is mounting. It may come as a surprise to many, Grunsky said, but there are strong pressures for easing controls on dangerous drugs.

Younger urged a marked increase in public reaction on the other side.

"Those who agree with me as to the urgent need for this legislation," he said, "should make their thoughts known to their assemblyman."
