Sears Roebuck Presents

The 'New' in Lingerie

A revolutionary development in the field of women's underfashions was announced here today by Sears, Roebuck and Co.

After extensive laboratory tests using hundreds of pounds of fabric and thousands of yards of elastic, a solution has been found for one of woman's perennial fashion dilemmas: how to hold up hosiery securely and yet avoid the discomforts and unsightly effects of garters.

Sears has mastered the challenge with the development of two new types of stretch panty garments:

One is a low-leg style with bands of specially woven cling elastic which firmly grips stocking tops, thus eliminating the need for garters.

The other development is a stretch panty in two styles — brief and medium length leg. The leg bands are fashioned with slots in which any number of garters may be inserted . . . or no garters at all, as personal preference and occasion dictate.

Any woman who has been made uncomfortable by the nagging tugs of ill-placed garter tabs will recognize a new solution. Now she can attach her garters where they do the most good; in addition, she may use as many fasteners as she needs to keep hose equally supported at all points, with no twisting or sagging to ruffle her composure. And if she chooses to wear her stretch panty without stockings, she need not sit on lumpy tabs after the garters are removed.

Both lightweight garments provide gentle control, which women like under contemporary sportswear, lounging clothes and other casuals. A spokesman pointed out that patents are pending on the new development, which represent a long-awaited breakthrough in the history of underfashions.
