

Lomita to Celebrate Second Anniversary

The City of Lomita will celebrate the second anniversary of incorporation June 25, according to Mayer Clyde S. Bernhardt. The day-long program, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with the city, will begin at 10 a.m. with a parade along Narbonne Avenue to 240th Street. Marchers will disperse at the Lomita Recreation Center. The balance of the day's program will be held at the center with activities geared to all age groups. Demonstrations will be given by the public utility companies, gas, electric and telephone, as well as the Los Angeles County Fire and Sheriff's Departments. A highlight will be the appearance of the fire department's helicopter and fire-fighters.

Laymen's Crusade Meeting Is Slated for Area Group

An organizational meeting of the California Laymen's Crusade, Inc. (CLC) will be held Saturday, May 28, 2705 185th St., Redondo Beach, at 10 a.m., to form a South Bay Chapter.

The meeting will be conducted by Ross Owens, CLC president and Protestant laymen of the 14 cities from Inglewood to San Pedro are invited to attend.

Speaker will be the Rev. H. P. Dunlop, Long Beach Presbyterian minister and world evangelist.

Purpose of the local chapter is to offer additional training in the art of winning souls to Christ and challenge men to become more active in the evangelistic outreach of their own churches, according to Mr. Owens, an ordained Baptist minister for 35 years. He emphasized the chapter is a fellowship and would never be the nucleus of a church.

PROGRAM OF the local chapter would include the New Testament practice of going to the market place with the gospel of Christ. The men will go in pairs into downtown areas every Saturday. All literature will bear the name of their respective churches.

Experts in the field of personal evangelism will be booked to share methods and experiences. It is hoped that a radio broadcast will be established to reach a wide audience throughout the state.

The South Bay Chapter will be the first of the CLC. Tracts, Gospels, and little Bibles will be on display at every meeting. Details on the forthcoming "California for Christ Crusade" now being proposed will be presented at the initial meeting.

The CLC is a non-profit, non-sectarian, laymen's organization which was incorporated in 1963. Men's Bible classes and church related organizations are urged to send representatives to the May 28 meeting.

(Continued from Page 1) penses totaling \$3,228,273 to train the 1,500. ANNOUNCEMENT of the expansion of the structural assembler program was made to United Automobile Workers union representatives who toured the company's training and DC-9 sub-assembly headquarters here at 2750 Lomita Blvd. The UAW represents most Aircraft Division production workers.

Victor Reuther and Leonard Woodcock, vice presidents of the UAW, which is holding its international convention in nearby Long Beach, were accompanied on the tour by 60 other union members, the majority from UAW affiliates overseas.

Their hosts at the Torrance facility were J. Curtis Counts, Douglas vice president of employe relations; W. L. Whittier, Aircraft Division vice president-deputy general manager; H. G. Newsome, Division manager of employe Relations, and Russ Bollin, Division manager of employe training.

The UAW officials also toured the Aircraft Division's major DC-9 and DC-8 assembly and manufacturing areas at its Long Beach plant.

THE DIVISION, which has more available jobs in production than people to fill them, recently began a drive to hire 5,000 skilled or partially experienced workers in production and engineering support areas. The 1,500 trainees are needed in addition to the skilled workers.

MDTA trainees receive four weeks of basic instruction in shop mathematics, blueprint reading, safety procedures and tool familiarization. Ten weeks of closely supervised on-the-job training follow in various production areas, with the final two weeks covering additional shop work.

Wages for the trainees begin at \$2.41 an hour and increase gradually to \$2.66 in the final weeks of the program. Final wage rate for the first 16 weeks following graduation is \$2.74 an hour.

IN ADDITION to the U.S. Labor Department, Douglas cooperates in the MDTA program with Local 148 of the UAW, the California Department of Industrial Relations' Division of Apprenticeship Standards and the California State Employment Service.

Other MDTA training courses now under way at the Douglas Aircraft and the Missile & Space Systems Divisions are for key punch operators, milling machine operators, computer language trainees, computer programmers, turret lathe operators, and engineering draftsmen.

The structural assembler program is in addition to more than 125 Douglas-sponsored courses in its divisions which give trained employes a chance to upgrade themselves. These courses include soldering, machine shop training, electrical assembly, and micromodule welding.
