Will Tour EM Building

Mrs. Pat Brown, wife of the Governor of California, is scheduled to visit Torrance next Friday morning at 10:40. She will tour the Educational Materials Building, at 2332 Plaza Del Amo. Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of the Torrance Unified School District, will be Mrs. Brown's host for the tour and will introduce her to the staff.

Mrs. Brown's Day in the Greater South Bay will begin when she visits the National Maritime Hall, 385 W. 18th St., San Pedro at 9:30 a.m., where she will meet union leaders and Mothers Club representatives.

After her Torrance visit, she will go to Hermosa Beach where she will present a tree from the South Bay Botanical Gardens to the Hermosa Garden Club.

Hermosa Friends of the Library will receive a rare document from California's First Lady, who is also scheduled to present an art scholarship during an art show to be staged by the South Bay Art Assn.

Refreshments and an art exhibit will highlight the Hermosa Valley Park stop.

Many public officials of the Beach cities and Chambers of Commerce will be present for Mrs. Brown's visit. The committee, making arrangements for the visit of the Governor's wife, extends an invitation to the public to join the First Lady as she tours the South Bay.

Poems, all with a religious theme, were judged in two divisions with awards made accordingly.




