For the safety of motorists during the long Fourth of July holiday weekend, the Greater Los Angeles Chapter of the National Safety Council has drafted a series of suggestions that will not only promote safety but increase the enjoyment of the holiday.

The major suggestions are:

- "Safety Check" your car before starting your holiday trip, and in this "safety check," include brakes, tires, all lights, windshield wipers, and rear view mirrors.

- Allow sufficient time for your trip to your initial destination and for your return home, keeping in mind that a motorist who is "fighting time" is "looking for trouble."


- Guard against fatigue, which is a contributing factor to many accidents. At the first signs of fatigue, give yourself a "rest break" either by a brief "time out" from driving or by changing drivers.

- Keep yourself and your car under control. The impatient driver is prone to "take chances" and this chance-taking can lead to involvement in accidents.


