Garden Checklist

1. Thin out fruit from trees that have set too much fruit. Strong supports are often needed to keep overloaded limbs from breaking.
2. Water dahlias at least once a week and feed them once a month, keeping the fertilizer away from the stems.
3. Water container grown plants more fre-

quently than you would those planted in the ground. Hanging baskets are especially suscepti-ble to drying out and should be watered daily — every other day at least.

4. Plant shade trees now from nursery con-tainers. No need to wait until winter's planting season if you keep the newly planted trees well irri-gated.

5. Bird of Paradise plants may be purchased in bloom this month. They like sun, a rich soil and plenty of water for best results.

Los Angeles Leads State In Immunization Campaign

Los Angeles County ac-counted for more than two-thirds of all immunizations administered to California children under six years of age during the first three months of 1966, it was an-nounced by Dr. Gerald A. Heidbreder, acting county health officer.

A study of figures re-leased by the county health de-partment revealed that of 59,000 doses of polio vaccine admin-istered in the state from Jan-uary through March of this year, 40,000 were given to

children in Los Angeles County. L. A. County children also received 44,000 shots of diph-theria, tetanus and whooping cough vaccine, which is ad-ministered in a single shot, out of a total of 65,000 given throughout the state during this same time period.

The County Health De-partment is conducting a special long-range immunization pro-gram with the assistance of the U. S. Public Health Serv-ice to encourage immuniza-tion of all children under age six for polio, diphtheria, tet-anus and other diseases. Dr. Heidbreder urged all parents whose children have not yet been immunized against polio, diphtheria, tet-

anus or whooping cough to visit their family doctor or county health center immedi-ately to start their young-sters on the protection they need.

VARIETY IS EASY


