California Bank Reports \$10 Million in Earnings

United California Bank earnings for the first half of 1966 exceeded \$10 million to establish a new high for the six-month period. The figure represents a gain of 6 per cent over earnings in the first half of 1965.

Net operating earnings were \$10,422,334 for the first half of 1966, compared with \$9,809,965 in the same period a year ago. Per share earnings were \$1.76 based on 5,931,617 average shares outstanding as compared with \$1.73 in the first half of last year.

Total deposits averaged \$2,816,563,000 during the six-month period, an increase of \$137,709,000 or 5.14 per cent over the corresponding period last year. Demand deposits averaged \$1,347,323,000, an 5.16 per cent; time de-

posits averaged \$1,198,540,000, an increase of \$110,003,000 or 10.10 per cent; and public deposits averaged \$270,700,000, a decrease of \$38,465,000 or 12.5 per cent.

Total loans averaged \$2,006,596,000 during the first half of 1966, a growth of 10.78 per cent. As of June 30, 1966 total deposits were \$2,917,828,165 as compared with \$2,823,799,999 on June 30, 1965. Loans were \$2,121,883,600 as compared with \$1,934,994,280 a year ago.

Hi-Shear Reports New Sales, Earnings Highs

Sales and earnings set new records during the first quarter of the current fiscal year at Hi-Shear Corp. of Torrance, George S. Wing, president and chairman of the board, announced this week.

Wing said the Torrance-based fastening system and ordnance manufacturing firm showed net earnings of \$250,800 in the quarter which ended May 31. Earnings amount to 70 cents per share, a 77 per cent increase over the first quarter of 1965.


Sales for the quarter amounted to \$3.8 million, up 40 per cent from the \$2.7 million reported in the first quarter a year ago. A backlog of \$5.6 million is on the books

—an increase of \$3 million since May 31, 1965.

"With our backlog up significantly and sales volume continuing at high levels," Wing said, "we look forward to another year of very favorable operating results at Hi-Shear."

Security Bank Earnings Hit Record High Levels

Security First National Bank has reported that consolidated net operating earnings for the first six months of 1966 were at an all-time high, rising 14.8 per cent above the same year-ago period.

Lloyd L. Austin, chairman of the board, said earnings for the second quarter were the highest for any quarter in the bank's history and were 16 per cent ahead of the like 1965 period.

Total resources, total loans, time deposits, and total deposits also were at record levels as of June 30, Austin said.

NET OPERATING income for the first half ended June totaled \$19,212,748, equal to \$1.68 per share on the 11,400,000 shares outstanding. This compared with \$1.67, 1977, or \$1.47 per share in the same period of 1965.

Earnings for the second quarter amounted to \$10,042,720, or 88 cents per share, against \$8,651,212, or 76 cents per share in the corresponding quarter last year.

Total resources at the end of the year's first half were \$4,995,611,247, compared with \$4,755,928,186 as of June 30, 1965.

TOTAL DEPOSITS rose to \$4,531,259,232, against \$4,329,142,775 a year ago. Time deposits were \$2,352,627,206, compared with \$2,241,880,218, while demand deposits were \$2,178,632,026, compared with \$2,087,262,557 as of June 30, 1965.

Loans, less reserves at June 30, 1966, totaled \$2,788,865,232, against \$2,436,862,698 a year earlier.
