# Storm Drain Approved Agreement for Carson

Approval of a two-way agreement expected to lead to the construction of additional storm drainage facilities in the Carson area was announced today.

Parties to the pact are the County Flood Control District and the County Road Department.

The agreement calls for the

District to prepare and administer a construction contract on behalf of the Road Department to build the storm drain in Avalon Boulevard between Victoria Street and a point south of Del Amo Boulevard.


The Road Department will pay for the total cost of the drain, according to Super-

visor Kenneth Hahn. "It is in the best public interest, in view of the District's considerable experience in storm drain construction, that this work be handled by its engineers and construction personnel," Hahn said.

The project will be designed for the Road Department by private engineers and the plans sent to the Flood Control District for bid advertising and construction.

Upon completion, the facility will be operated and maintained by the district.
