

New Era in State Government to Begin Next Year

 It looks as though our current session will be history by the time you read this. Even the hotly controversial items still on our agenda are moving, and the differences between our two houses are gradually being ironed out.

The measures relating to constitutional revision, conflict of interest, and legislative salaries have just passed the Senate, but in a form unacceptable to the Assembly, so they were quickly sent to conference. The Senate version calls for the establishment of a code of ethics committee to deal with problems involving conflicts between a Legislator's private business and his public responsibilities.

The Assembly version previously passed and sent to the Senate called for action by the courts to prevent use of legislative rights and powers for private gain. The Assembly unanimously rejected the upper house version because "it was not stiff enough."

THE CONSTITUTIONAL amendment which would provide for annual general sessions, which would authorize the Legislature to fix its own salaries must be approved by the voters at the November general election before it can go into effect. The pay raise bill, which would set the amount at \$16,000 per year, has now passed both houses, but cannot go into effect unless voters approve the amendment.

The school-aid bill, amended last week to authorize an additional \$26 million in grants to certain local school districts, is now awaiting final action in the Senate. It would provide some \$16 million more in grants to impoverished school districts, and \$10 million more to help school district lower class size in grades one to three.

THE BILL intended to help local police agencies control individuals or groups who incite riots turned out to be less controversial than many had expected. After a closed session on it, the Assembly

Criminal Procedures Committee sent it to the floor, where it passed handily after only a brief debate.

Proponents of the bill argued that provisions regarded as "too harsh" had been eliminated by the committee. Op-

ponents contended that the measure is essentially punitive in purpose, and does nothing at all to reach and eliminate the really fundamental causes of civic disturbances. It was also argued that the bill is aimed at a

particular minority racial group, and that its equitable enforcement would be virtually impossible.

IN ITS present form, the bill would make it a misde-

meanor for anyone to prod another into arranging or participating in a riot. The penalty for conviction of violating the law would be a year in county jail a fine of \$1,000, or both.

At the end of this record-smashing special session approaches, most of us are eyeing the future with considerable interest, but also with something akin to misgivings. When the 1967 Legislature reconvenes, the familiar faces of many friends will be miss-

ing. Because of reapportionment, the Senate will have a completely new look. Many Assemblymen will shift to seats in the upper house, and newcomers will take their seats. A new era in state government will have started.

Goodwill Hurt by Thieves

A girl placed a doll bed beside a Goodwill box, but it was gone when the pickup truck arrived. A woman left a good television set there and it, too, disappeared.

One man apprehended stealing mattresses beside a box claimed that articles like that were left there for poor people like him. But, he wasn't destitute, he operated a second hand store.

"The well-meaning intentions of people who leave valuable articles outside Goodwill boxes is being wholly defeated," Walter L. Case, executive vice president, said. "Handicapped people's jobs depend upon these articles that are being stolen and steps must be taken to safeguard their jobs."

THE FIRST step is an appeal to donors to call for the home pickup of all articles too large to go into the box. The second is to request public assistance in notifying the police of any thievery observed.

If funds were available, Case said, "stake outs" would be established at some 190 box locations. Since that isn't possible, there is a standing offer of \$25 for information leading to the conviction of any thief. In all cases the police should be notified.
