Previous stops have included St. Louis, Kansas City, Albuquerque and Las Vegas—and a side trip to visit the Grand Canyon.

## Dorothy Digs

Two pests that are still doing a lot of damage this summer are snails or slugs and sowbugs.

Both these pests are best controlled by baits although unfortunately one kind will not take care of both.

For the snails and slugs, a bait containing methaldehyde that attracts and kills is, in my opinion the best to use. The extra poisons added to some brands make them hazardous to pets and children. I also prefer the pellets because you can throw them in places where it is not possible to put piles of meal. Also you need use smaller amounts per time.

For sowbugs there is a special bait that attracts and kills this obnoxious insect. Sowbugs are very hard on young transplants and seedlings as are snails. Both baits should be used when you set out tender transplants as these pests can ruin your new plants in a very short time.

VISITS included hyperion treatment plant, Los Angeles International Airport, the Los Angeles Civic Center, and the State Division of Highways. He also visited a large plant which makes pre-cast, prestressed concrete beams used in freeway construction.

Pfladerer also spent some time at Marineland, Knott's Berry Farm, and Disneyland.

The trip is part of a program sponsored by the University of Illinois and a Chicago-based construction firm. Pfladerer is a civil engineering student and is specializing in highway engineering design.

## Cabrillo Resources Show Gain

An increase of nearly \$1.5 million in savings accounts at Cabrillo Savings and Loan Association was reported during the first six months of 1965, according to the mid-year report released by the association.

Current savings total \$16,126,242 and total assets are now at \$20,478,788—an increase of nearly \$1 million since mid-1965.

Total loans have increased by more than \$2 million in the past 12 months to \$18,649,616. The report also shows that no foreclosed properties have been taken over by the association.
