Retarded Children Benefit From Lions' Football Game

Sixty of the South Bay's finest prep football players will take the field tomorrow for the second annual South Bay All-Star Football Game.

Scheduled for 8:15 at El Camino College, the game will pit the East against the West with 23 local high schools represented by at least one player.

The game is sponsored by the West Torrance Lions Club as a benefit for the Southwest Association for Retarded Children.

Each coach Jack Robinette of Narbonne is very optimistic after spending two weeks of practice looking at a massive line, a smooth backfield and a talented pair of ends.

"Our line is not only big, it's fast," Robinette said. "And our biggest man (240-pound Rodney White of Narbonne) is our fastest."

The East backfield is sparked by Sam Gipson from Banning. Gipson was an All-City pick last season. He is a constant threat when he turns on the speed.

Quarterbacking the team will be Joe DeMasa of Narbonne. He will share duties with Phil Smyth of Lasuen. Both are better-than-average passers and they will have

great targets.

Running at ends will be Gardena's Tenny Warren, an All-City and All-South Bay pick from the Marine League champions, and Gwen Cooper, an All-Sky League choice from Leuzinger.

The West team has had its share of injuries, but coach Ron Terry of Palos Verdes is quietly confident of victory. He points to last year's game when the East was a heavy favorite but the West pulled out a 12-7 win.

Terry feels his light but speedy line and powerful backfield can pull off another upset. Stalwarts on the line include Ron Roberts, a converted back from Morning-side, and Alan L'Hommedieu, El Segundo.

Signal calling will be divided between Redondo's

Dana Clyde and El Segundo's Jerry Filson. The two have waged a duel for starting rights during the entire practice period with Filson apparently getting a late favorite's role. Bill Tapp, All-CIF running back, is a big threat for the West.

Tickets will be available at the gate with box offices opening at 6:30 p.m. Cost is \$2 for adults and \$1 for children under 12.

Southwood Pitching Sizzles, 8-1

Adair One-Hits North Torrance

Pitching is a 'big thing' with Southwood Little League.

The one-two team of David Adair and Larry Farrah is flirting with the 6-foot level as 12-year-olds and taking advantage of their size to mow down the opposition in tournament play.

Adair won his third victory against North Torrance East in the California Section 6 playoffs at Tordondo Field last night to qualify Southwood for the semi-finals Friday night.

Adair gave up a leadoff single to Henry Wayne and the only other runners to get aboard were Mike Russell whose fly ball was mishandled in left field and Phil Manahan whose grounder scored Russell in the fourth.

Southwood hit the scoreboard with three runs in the third and four runs in the fourth. Farrah doubled home two runs and scored himself on a rundown with Adair caught between first and second.

Two of the four runs in the fourth came with the bases loaded when Manahan gave up his only two walks. Adair closed the scoring with a towering homer in the fifth.

Tonight's winner between Manhattan Beach and Los Altos of Long Beach will meet Southwood Friday in the semi-finals.

Farrah, who has a no-hitter and two hits in two appearances, will be the Southwood pitcher.

Southwood got into the sectional by beating Silver Spur Saturday at Carson Field, 4-1. Mark Farnum's home run broke up a string of seven perfect innings by Farrah.

North Torrance East came from behind to beat Pacific Coast, 6-1, with a 6-run sixth inning. Manahan hit a grand slam home run to cap the rally.

Southwood has beaten North Redondo, 2-0; Sunset, 20-0; Tordondo, 7-2, and Silver Spur and North Torrance East.

Manhattan Little League put together four runs on four errors and a single in the second inning to beat Hawthorne Wiseburn, 6-4, Monday evening.

Wiseburn's four runs came on three homers. Catcher Larry Stone hit a pair in his first two at bats and Jeff Locke preceded Stone's third inning drive with a two-run blow over the centerfield fence.

Stone banged his first homer against the scoreboard and his second went 250 feet down the leftfield line.

Manhattan will play Los Altos, District 38 champion, in tonight's game. Loh Altos had a bye on Monday.

In sub-section games Monday night, East Anaheim (46) defeated Buena Park American (29) at Nodwalk and Oceanview of Huntington Beach (55) blanked Tustin Eastern (30) at Santa Ana, 2-0.

These winners meet Thursday at Tordondo in the sectional semi-finals.
