D. John Barry, 22821 Kathryn Ave., has assumed the duties of president of the California Postal Union, following the resignation of the group's chief officer.

Barry, a Torrance resident and clerk at the city's post office since 1960, has been serving as executive vice president of the statewide group. He began his career in the Postal Employees Union as secretary of the Torrance local and became state secretary-treasurer in 1964.

He was promoted to the post of executive vice president two months ago and named to the top position Aug. 1.

A BRANCH of the National Postal Union, the state organization has 4,400 members in 74 locals.

In assuming his new duties, Barry pledged continued efforts to attain recognition of the postal union by Congress, including "sanctions on management and a law that would provide for grievance procedures and true collective bargaining."

He said many people might be surprised if rank and file postal employees were to vote on whether they should be given the right to strike.

"AS IT STANDS," Barry said, "we do not have this right and, with due respect to the responsibility of our position, I personally feel that because of the key position the postal service plays in the well-being of the country, a postal strike carried on for even a week is like the atom bomb — too powerful a weapon for us to want to use."

It would take several months for the nation to recover from the effects of such a strike, Barry declared.

"By the same token," he continued, "something has to be done for our position. Some substitute has to be granted for the no-strike right. It is fantastic, for example, to note how many grievances end up with a decision in favor of management."
