

Among some 3,000 members of the 4th Infantry division who landed in South Vietnam last Saturday was PFC Joseph A. DeCillis Jr., 26. Conference on Child, Computer Set at UCLA

How does a child view himself in a world where automation threatens the security of his father's job? What is the teacher's role and the librarian's role in making sure that the school experience is something more than just "conditioning?"

Answers to these and other provocative problems of today's accelerated pace of living will be explored at a special one-day conference on "The Computer, The Child, and Literature," Saturday at UCLA.

Conducted by two prominent specialists in the field, Jerome Cushman and Robert Hayes, the program is planned for parents, teachers, librarians, and all who work with children. The session is presented by University of California Extension, the UCLA School of Library Service, and the Southern California Council on Literature for

Children and Young People. Enrollments will be accepted at the door at the time of the conference, scheduled for 9:30 a.m. in Haines Hall 39. Enrollment information is available at University Extension offices in Westwood.

Mass Employment Project Asked Here

Noting that "unemployment is still the key factor in poverty and community problems," Supervisor Kenneth Hahn today called on the federal government to implement "a realistic work training program" which he first suggested more than a year ago.

The plan would involve provisions to hire and train unskilled workers in Federal public works and aerospace contracts awarded private firms. The Federal Government would provide a major portion of their salaries until the training was complete.

Hahn advanced the proposal to United States Deputy Attorney General Ramsey Clark and Under-Secretary of Commerce Leroy Collins when they were in Los Angeles immediately following the 1965 riots.

BOTH WERE here between Aug. 20 and Sept. 1 last year. They expressed interest in his proposal. Hahn said, and assured him the federal government would move in with a massive employment program.

Hahn said such a massive employment program has not materialized. The Anti-Poverty program in Los Angeles, he said, has spent approximately \$9.5 million since the riots. Much of that has not been involved employing and training workers, he added.

Hahn's proposal would involve unskilled workers being assigned to work with full trained persons in private enterprise and therefore learn by "observation and by doing."

THE NUMBER of unemployed workers assigned to an industry would depend upon the size of the Federal contract awarded the firm.

During the first few months of employment, the federal government would pay up to 90 per cent of the worker's salary. The remainder would be paid by the private industry involved.

As the worker gained additional skills and actually became productive for the private firm, the amount of federal salary would diminish and the private contractor would pay a greater amount.



ALPHA BETA WHY PAY MORE?

"THIS WOULD provide a sliding scale of government-industry payment based on the difference between a highly trained skilled worker and one who is learning," Hahn explained. "Within a year or two, the worker would be properly educated, trained, and motivated as a skilled employee and would most likely become a permanent and valuable worker in private industry."

He stressed that the private industry would not be burdened with the cost of training employees but would pay for only the true value received from the workman.

At the same time, the individual would be taken off the unemployment rolls, gain a sense of earning his salary and of being productive.

"I feel a cooperative program such as this is far superior to continuing to send out welfare and unemployment in surance checks when there is a demand for skilled workers, yet great unemployment," Hahn added.
