Ourselves Explode For League Crown In Youth Slo-Pitch

The Local Boys erupted for four runs in the fourth inning to defeat the Ourselves 4-3 and capture the first annual B.A.M.A.A. Youth Slo-Pitch tournament at Torrance, Saturday night.

The Local Boys advanced to the finals by defeating the Gardena Bombers by forfeit.

The Ourselves reached the finals by shutting out the Moonshiners 5-0. In the game with the Moonshiners the Ourselves scored two runs in the first inning on Bruce Hazelton's second homer in two tournament games. They scored three more runs in the second inning on four hits and a walk. Andy Nishimoto's two run single highlighted the rally.

In the Championship game the Ourselves scored a run in the second inning on a single by Terry Atkinson, a double by Chuck Fernandes and Ed Holmes sacrifice fly. They made it 3-0 in the fourth on Fernandes single, a double by Steve French and a dropped fly ball.

The Local Boys scored all their runs in the fourth inning on singles by Louie Reyes and Steve Zack, a double by Fred Ihde, an infield hit by Bill Herrera, a throwing error, and Pete Pepe's single. Except for the fourth inning the Local Boys got only one other hit but the one explosion was enough.

County Fair Winner To Breed Derby Race Winner, Determine

Incentive plus is in prospect for top fillies and mares at the forthcoming 14-day Los Angeles County Fair race meeting opening Sept. 16, it was assured this week with the announcement that the winner of the \$10,000 added Las Madras Handicap will earn, in addition to the purse, a breeding to the champion thoroughbred stallion, Determine.

Determine, a Kentucky Derby winner in 1954 and the sire of numerous stakes winners since his retirement to the stud 10 years ago, stands at the Laguna Seca Ranch of the late Frank C. Bishop. It was the latter who donated

the service to Determine to the Fair in order that the Las Madras accrue even greater prestige than it already enjoys.

For some years it has been traditional for the winning Las Madras filly or mare to earn a trip to the court of an outstanding California stallion, but in Determine the 1966 victress will find herself going courting with a horse ranking among the top half dozen California-breds of all time. Not only did Determine win the coveted Kentucky Derby, he produced a son in the equine person of Decidedly, who duplicated that feat eight years later in 1962.

Fresh from his second straight CRA Sprint Car victory, George Benson of San Jose is set to take on a forty car field of Indianapolis-type machines in tonight's eight event CRA racing program at Ascot Park in Gardena. Racing starts at 8:30 p.m., preceded by qualifying runs at 7 p.m. on the half-mile clay oval.

Benson has pushed the former A. J. Foyt owned Offenhauser special to victory for the past two weeks at Ascot. The car is now owned by Max Maxson of Downey and Dean Jeffries of Hollywood, custom car builder.

Out to stop him in the 30 lap feature will be last week's second and third place finishers, Dick Fries of San Diego and Mike Mosley of La Puente. Both worked their way up from the rear of the pack, but by that time Benson was far ahead to catch in the remaining laps last week.

Besides the 30 lap feature, other racing on the night's speed track includes a 15 lap semi-main, 6 lap consolation; four 6 lap heat races, and a 3 lap trophy dash, which kicks off the night's racing.
