Spartans Play for Team in '66

A school can have a team full of league stars, but without unity—the team is still a loser, and if South's gridiron coach Ken Swift can get this the Spartans have a good chance of being one of the top contenders for the '66 Bay League Championship.

Coach Swift, in a recent interview, stressed the need for team unity with the idea that "you've got to get the kids playing for the team—not themselves," this has too often proved in the past to be the downfall of the Spartans.

The old saying goes the "this year will be different," and it just might well be, because South has finally met the four basic requirements for a winning team and a winning season. Number One is "personnel," because after two years, Swift feels that the Spartans "have a better suited offense—one based on quickness and intelligence, not size." Number Two: the "team unity," the players playing for the team not themselves. Number Three: "condition," and right now South's in good condition for the season. Number Four: "We have a better coaching staff."

All-Star Blue and Gold Game Scheduled Friday

Sectional supremacy will be one of the prime motivating factors in the minds of gridders on the Blues (North) and Golds (South) teams in the first annual Los Angeles City High School All-Star Football Classic, this Friday evening, at the East Los Angeles College Stadium.

In the past three years the city high school football championship has been rotated among three leagues—West Valley (Birmingham), 1963; Marine (Gardena), 1964; and Southern (Los Angeles), 1965. For years, the Southern League has been "touted" as the bulwark of L.A. City football . . . in recent seasons, the teams in the two Valley Leagues and the Marine League have challenged this rating.

Now the East and West Valley, Western, and Northern Leagues have pooled top graduated senior footballers from their respective schools to compose the Blues, while the cream of talent from schools in the Southern, Marine, and Eastern Leagues combine to make up the Golds.

Spearheading the Blues' lineup are All-City standouts like fullback Howard Williams and center Dave Swenson of Taft, last year's West Valley champs and city play-offs semi-finalists; tackle Ron Gallaheer and linebacker Marv Montgomery, Sylmar; halfback Greg Mimm, Westchester, Western League titans and city runners-up; tackle Cliff McConahay, guard Don Rose, Birmingham; and center Tom Shaw, Monroe.

The Golds are led by All-City "Co-Player of the Year" guard Reggie Lowe of Los Angeles, plus All-City selections fullback Charley Moch, linebacker Curtis Simmons, and halfback Lamar Mills, Los Angeles; end Tenny Warren, Gardena's Marine loop victors and city semi-finalists; tackles Clark Davis and Rodney White, Narbonne; halfbacks Sam Gipson, Banning, Felix Garza, Wilson, and Rogers Cain, Roosevelt.

The Blues launched twice-a-day workouts two weeks ago at Pierce College with 21 players reporting directly from playing in the San Fernando Valley's East-West game.

The Golds undertook their pre-game preparations at USC's Cromwell Field with twice-a-day sessions scheduled.

Over 150 Drivers Set For Ascot Speed Test


