(Continued on Page A-2) out of order during a brief exchange with a speaker, then declared, "I'm still the chairman and I'll be the chairman for a long, long time."

Speakers opposing the amendment drew loud applause several times during the long debate. Mrs. Florence Sommers, 1621 Flower St., told the council she "would rather take my chances with a foolish public than with four polished politicians."

OTHER SPEAKERS hinted at investigations into city government, prompting Vico to tell the group to "have at it."

"I'm not changing my vote," Vico declared, "If there were 50,000 people here I wouldn't change."

Sciarrotta told the audience he had considered calling a special meeting to reconsider the amendment Monday, but added he changed his mind when a group of people got on the phone and intimated there is going to be an investigation. He would welcome such investigations, he said.

Final vote on the issue was 4-3. In approving the \$7,300 appropriation, council members provided for election expenses which will be charged by the county and for the printing of an eight-page brochure which will present arguments for and against the proposed amendment.

(Continued from Page A1) to \$4 per employe. Under the formula, a firm employing 50 persons would pay a net fee of \$195 per year. Vending machine license fees, which were increased by 25 per cent last November, have not been hiked in the new ordinance.

A second reading is necessary before the ordinance becomes effective.

IN OTHER action last night, the council: Authorized the city to purchase three parcels of tax delinquent land from the county. Two of the parcels will be used for street purposes, while the third will become part of a drainage sump.

Ordered "No Parking" signs installed along a 350-foot section of Maricopa Street east of Victor Street. Parking will be prohibited on both sides of the street between 7 and 5 a.m.
