

# Retraining Plan Wins Support From Shriver

Antipoverty Director Sargent Shriver has agreed with Supervisor Kenneth Hahn's stand that cooperation from private enterprise is the prime factor in training thousands of unemployed for productive roles.

In response to a letter from Hahn, Shriver said: "I could not agree with you more that business plays an important role in the 'war on poverty'."

Hahn had suggested that antipoverty officials should enlist the support of the 130,000 private businesses in Los Angeles County to take at least one person into their employ for a year for training. He pointed out this would virtually solve the unemployment problem in this County and would add to the effectiveness of job training programs now under way.

Hahn said, "than the annual \$9,700 cost of training an individual through the Job Corps."

Shriver acknowledged that Job Corps costs per trainee are "close to the \$9,700 figure." He said other programs run by his agency are retraining persons for approximately \$1,000 per year.

"WE NEED full community participation to ensure that business fulfills its responsibility of taking on the people our programs serve, particularly members of minority groups, as trainees under existing programs," Shriver said.

Shriver added that possibly in light of "tight labor markets" it would be "good business" for private enterprise to take unskilled workers into their employ and train them without a full subsidy from the government.

Hahn said actual placement is the key to getting citizens off the unemployment rolls after they are retrained. He pointed out that just training a person and paying him from federal funds for "busy work" sets the stage for "but another type of welfare pro-

# Assignment TV

HOLLYWOOD — "HOW'D YOU LIKE to meet the nicest Indian in town?" asked the man from ABC.

I allowed as how I hadn't really thought about it, but I was game as long as we didn't have to sit crosslegged in front of a teepee and do the peace pipe bit.

That's how I met Jim, the Friendly Sioux who plays an important role in the lives of "The Monroes," one of the most promising of the new television shows. As it turned out, Jim isn't played by an Indian at all; he never is in Hollywood. He is portrayed by Ron Soble, a former middleweight boxer, once a bouncer at a San Francisco club and now a successful and articulate Hollywood actor.

"The Monroes" — an hour-long adventure series with an

intriguing plot — portrays the struggle of five orphaned youngsters to settle in the rugged Wyoming country in the 1870's. The show is filmed entirely in the spectacular Jackson Hole region of Grand Teton National Park. Soble recently returned from a rugged two months there.

"IT'S A GREAT story — basically Babes In The Woods — played in the days when the West was young," said Soble. "When the parents die on arrival in the valley, young Clay Monroe, still a teenager, becomes head of the family and undertakes to establish a home for himself and his brothers and sisters. During the series the children grow and mature."

A strong recommendation for the series is that it was originated by the man responsible for "And Now, Miguel," a current film of worth.

"All of us have strong competition from the scenery. The opening shot is reminiscent of the start of 'The Sound of Music,'" said Soble. "The intent has been to capture some of the epic aspects of the winning of the West. The producer felt that the scenic values couldn't be reproduced in a studio, so the entire show is being shot out of doors on location. He's even got us riding bareback. Now, there's a stunt! Try bouncing along on a horse without anything to cling to except his mane."

His present assignment makes Indian Jim Soble dream of less hectic days.

"I REMEMBER how it used to be back in the Fifties on live television shows like 'Studio One,' 'Suspense' and 'Robert Montgomery Presents,'" said Soble. "We'd meet for a first reading of the script. The writer would be there and we'd have an opportunity to ask Rod Serling, for example, what he meant by a certain line and you could actually work out a scene at the table."

"Later you moved to a rehearsal hall, where the scenery was marked off in tape lines on the floor. If the furniture was in the wrong place or a line didn't sound right, you reworked it until it was playable."

"Today? You sure as hell should have done all this in your bedroom the night before you got to the studio! There is no reading. You never see the writer. It's no use memorizing the script because the lines are changed right up to the moment you get on camera. Except in rare instances there is no director, as such. No one to tell you how he wants the scene played. You just do it as your instinct tells you."

"WOULD YOU believe it? I've known TV directors who didn't even know how to TALK to an actor. They're worried largely about continuity and editing as they shoot. If they could make TV films without actors, some directors would be happy. But this reliance on the actors' experience has made television an actor's medium. The stage is a writer's medium; the movies are a director's medium; but TV is for actors.

"The movies are still the kindest medium for a performer. Anyone who is in a feature film and is anything less than great shouldn't be in the business. He has rehearsal and time and protection from director, cameraman and editor. They can make you look good. On television, the actor is out there alone."

And when you're an Indian, riding bareback in the middle of Grand Teton National Park, that can be very alone indeed.
