# Greek Festival Will Feature Authentic Dance, Music, Food

Louise Anderson, a performing member of the Hellenic Dancers, will be leading many Greek dances at the second annual "Greek Festival," to be held at the Torrance Recreation Center, Oct. 1 and 2.

The St. Katherine Greek Orthodox Ladies Philoptochos Society, sponsors of the Festival, have had Mrs. Anderson teaching Greek dances to many of the parishioners and their children on a weekly basis, in preparation for the Festival.

Mrs. Anderson is a psychotherapist by profession, with an office in West Los Angeles. She became interested in Greek music and dance about six years ago, and devotes much of her free time to the study and practice of this field, "because of its magnificent spirit and beauty, and because of the underlying natural therapeutic value that Greek folk dance has for the human being. It is not an intellectual exercise of tricky little steps, but a human commentary on the joy and pain of living—emotion balanced by the restraint of a rhythmic framework. This group social activity, where people dance together and hold hands, serves to counteract the feelings of loneliness and isolation in all human beings, especially in our modern, increasingly depersonalized society."
