

# Mater Dei Tops CIF in Football

Defending CIF 4-A Champion Mater Dei of Santa Ana and 3-A King Covina are picked as the top teams in the CIF after both opened the 1966 campaign with impressive weekend wins.

Mater Dei, under new coach Bob Woods and new quarterback Jack Wigmore, dropped highly-rated Redlands, 19-0. Wigmore worked his running backs Bob Mendez and Mike Morgan with skillful play-calling while the defensive unit, headed by Steve Vegge and Steve Pultrak, limited the Terriers to one penetration beyond the Monarch 40 yard line.

West Covina, winner of the "AAA" title last season, unleashed a potent running attack and a sensational ball carrier in Phil Lanzarotto as the Spartans crushed El Monte, 34-8. Lanzarotto scored four times on runs of 30 yards or longer.

# Two Late Scores Win for Camino

El Camino College scored two touchdowns in the final minute and 43 seconds Saturday to preserve an unblemished football string of five victories against Pierce College, 22-16.

A pass interference call set up a 1-yard touchdown run by Quarterback Bob Quarry and following a successful outside kick, he threw a 46-yard touchdown pass to Dave MacGillivray for the winning TD with 38 seconds to play.

Dave Courtney recovered the outside kick.

Not only does El Camino hold a 5-0 monopoly of Pierce, but also has a 17-0-1 record against Western State Conference opponents lifetime. Prior victories over Pierce were 48-7 in 1949 and 28-13, 33-6 and 21-6 in the last three years.

In the 22-16 win Saturday at Murdock Stadium, Quarry had a fairly successful night of passing, completing six passes out of 22 attempts for 159 yards to average 26.5 yards.

Both Clyde and Quarry had a pass intercepted. Clyde's intercepted pass gave the Brahmms a 6-0 lead. Bob Juba, Pierce halfback, carried the intercepted pass 33 yards for the Brahmms touchdown.
