### Rams Enjoy Plush Living

While the Los Angeles Rams are in town for home games at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum, they will be housed this fall at the Plush Horse Inn in Redondo Beach.

The Rams are currently on a three-week road trip which carries them to Detroit today, Minnesota next Sunday, and Chicago, Oct. 23.

The ball club will have only two other games on the road at San Francisco, Nov. 6, and Baltimore, Nov. 7, allowing the Rams almost the entire last half of the season in the comfort of the quiet beach town.

Harry Tracton, owner of the Plush Horse Restaurant, said the team holds its workouts at Blair Field in Long Beach. The distance between the practice field and Redondo is 15 miles.

George Allen, the new coach of the Rams, has purchased a home on the Palos Verdes Peninsula. From top of the hill he can keep a pretty good eye on his fans.

Taking a look at Friday night's football fanfare, two preppers share laurels as "co-players of the week." They are Back Dave Boyd of West and Guard Charlie Reade of Bishop Montgomery.

Boyd, switched to wingback from end a few days ago, proved his worth by running 81 yards for a touchdown in the second half of the Garden Grove game that "moved" West High to a 21-13 victory.

Dave carried the ball 12 times during the game for respectable 131 yards and an 11-yard average. That big one helped his average, but Boyd, a junior, may have found a home in the West backfield.

The best performance by a guard this season was turned in by No. 62 of Bishop Montgomery—Charlie Reade. Lawndale runs a lot of counter plays. The quarterback likes to keep the ball and run with it inside and outside of tackle, and he is also a good passer. But Reade messed up the whole Lawndale attack especially in the first half. He wouldn't let the running backs get far enough into the secondary for Linebacker at Kealey to get a piece of the action.

Charlie, a returning letterman, is reported in the program at 185 pounds and 5-foot, 11-inches. His performance Friday night made believers of those who thought his size was exaggerated.

After three weeks of football, Bishop Montgomery players have come up with some fine individual performances which have been combined for three winning team efforts.

Center Pat Kealey had his best game against Mira Costa, but he's in there all the time. Pat had a better chance to show his stuff against Costa because of the threat of running back Steve Verry.

Steve, who injured his knee against Culver City and will miss a few Costa games, is a pretty good challenge for an opposing linebacker and Kealey handled him.

Two Bishop Montgomery backs who show a great deal of running class, but missed most of their junior year with injuries are Ed Gilles and Bob Comstock. By winning for his forth explosive touchdown of the season Friday night, Gilles has become a convincing fullback. Comstock is almost as hard a runner and a sure passer. When you put these two fellows in the same backfield with Quarterback Dan Graham and fleet back Chuck Bongard, the accent is on offense.

The result is a trio of lopsided victories including a 24-6 win over a Lawndale team that should win the Pioneer League.

### Boyd's 81-Yard Run Sparks Win

West High's sleeping giants thundered into action in the second half Friday to overcome a 13-0 deficit and upset Garden Grove, 21-13, in a non-conference football game at Warrior Stadium.

The Warriors came alive in the third quarter when Dave Boyd, a halfback converted from end, galloped 81 yards down the sideline for a touchdown. The run electrified the capacity crowd and put West back into the game.

Boyd tied the game at 13-13 halfway into the fourth period with a 9-yard run and guard Allen Coward booted the second of three conversions to put West ahead to stay.

The insurance was added with just 59 seconds remaining when Joel Hons ran 18 yards on an end sweep for a touchdown. The final score was set up when Craig Carver intercepted a pass on the West 28-yard line. Carver was stopped on the Garden Grove 45, but a penalty moved the ball to the 30.

Twice, the Garden Grove linemen jumped the signal and when play finally resumed, West had a first-and-ten on the 20. Hons scored on the third play from scrimmage.

Coach Fred Peterson was hoisted into the air when the gun sounded, carried to the locker room, and dumped in the shower.

"I'd take a shower just like that every week," Peterson said.

It was like two different football games.

West was plagued in the first half by the same mistakes and bad breaks which marked 18-0 and 22-6 losses to Rolling Hills and Torrance. Fumbles, pass interceptions, and West's failure to make the first on critical third down situations helped Garden Grove.

The Argonauts scored in the first quarter when guard Mike Hanes recovered a West fumble. Four plays later, halfback Fred Miller capped a 41-yard drive with a 2-yard plunge.

Miller scored again 43 seconds into the second period when end John Retzer intercepted a pass on the West 37. Retzer ran 63 yards to the end zone, but a clipping penalty brought the football back to the West 28.

### South Races To 15-49 Win


South High defeated Hawthorne, 15-49, in a Bay League cross country meet at the South course.

About the only thing proven Friday night in the Bay League opener between South and Santa Monica is Samo is going to be the powerhouse of the league again this year. The Vikings blanked South, 34-13. Last season Santa Monica captured the league title with a 5-1 record.

The first half was all Santa Monica's with South continually thrown for loss after loss in the first quarter.

The Vikings' first score came with 24 seconds remaining in the first quarter on a 6-yard run by halfback Gene Martin, capping a 58-yard downfield drive.

Dale Hewitt got things going for South in the second quarter on a 29-yard punt return, but Quarterback Snapper Douglas' pass was intercepted by Viking back Nick Larez.

A 19 yard handoff from Quarterback Dan Morrison to Martin and a screen pass to Larez for another 44 yards set Santa Monica three yards out from the goal. It was Martin going over for the touchdown and the Vikings were on their way to a 28-0 halftime lead.

A fumble by Jeff Arrieta, with Samo guard Dennis White recovering, led to another score. A series of screen passes and a 6-yard run by Steve Conti put Samo 12 yards out. Morrison threw a screen pass to Tony McNeal and Santa Monica led, 21-0. But Santa Monica came back with 1:18 remaining in the half with Martin again sprinting for a 30 yard touchdown.

South finally caught on fire in the second half with a handoff to Arrieta for 12 yards to put the Spartans on the scoreboard. Two minutes later an intercepted pass was grabbed by Spartan tackle Byron Norwood who ran for 23 yards before being dropped on the 5-yard line. It was Back Jeff Wang who crashed over from three yards out for the score.

### Lawndale Falls To Montgomery

In football the front line rarely makes the headlines. But the guys up front did the kind of a job that wins football games and because of it Bishop Montgomery High owns a 24-6 win over a strong Lawndale team. The triumph took place Friday at Leuzinger.

A sample of the defense came early in the game. A 2-yard gain was the best the Lawndale Cardinals could do in their first eight offensive plays. Sandwiched in between Quarterback Jim Coleman was thrown for losses of 10 and 8 yards trying to pass. It was a reverse of last year when Lawndale played havoc with Bishop's Dan Graham.

Guard Charlie Reade, Tackles Mark Leamy and John Sullivan, and Linebacker Pat Kealey stole the show. Guard Rich Pipkin, Tackle Mike Brucoleri, and Ends Jay Crawford and Steve Patterson are mentioned as the supporting cast.

Beating the favorite of the Pioneer League was done with three touchdown passes by Graham and a 44-yard run by Ed Gilles.

But so superior was the Montgomery defense, Lawndale's best efforts in 55 plays were runs of 11, 9, 7 and 7 yards.

Quarterback Coleman completed 5 of 6 passes for 18 yards, but he lost 28 yards on three other tries. On a pair of quarterback keeper plays in the third quarter he made a key first down on the 4-yard line and scored three plays later for Lawndale's only TD in the third quarter.

Montgomery's only offensive play in 10 minutes of the third quarter was a fumble by Graham while taking the ball from center. Dan Felix recovered for Lawndale at the 15. It was the same spot where Montgomery stopped Lawndale after three straight first downs. The Cards converted the break into their only TD. They got back in the game, 18-6, after trailing at halftime, 18-0.

To start the game each

ran for a touchdown of short yardage in the second and fourth quarters.

Torrance travels to Aviation next Friday to meet its third straight Pioneer League opponent. The Tartars league opener is Oct. 21 at home against Beverly Hills.
