The Uniform Housing Code was adopted last January as part of a "workable program" required by the federal government in order to qualify for urban renewal funds. Initial enforcement of the code is scheduled to begin in a triangular section in the northwestern corner of the city.

to postpone further action on the proposed cemetery until Nov. 22. Tentative approval of the proposed development, which also includes 135 new homes, was voted by the council in July.

DEVELOPER Dan E. Butcher and Don Wilson are seeking a conditional use permit for the cemetery. Tentative approval of their plans came on a 4-3 vote of the council, despite protests from residents throughout the adjacent residential area.

Should the ballot measure be qualified, no further action could be taken on the cemetery plan until an election is held.

At least 10 per cent of the city's registered voters must sign the petition to bring the proposed ordinance to a vote.

FULLER SAID similar action by residents in the city of Inglewood halted expansion of Inglewood Park Cemetery in 1960. At that time, the cemetery association had

advanced plans to expand into an area south of Manchester Boulevard.

He also told the council the planned cemetery here would be destructive to the planned development of the city and to the community's tax structure. Councilmen made no comment on Fuller's presentation.
