Explorer Post Formed To Study Oceanography

The first Explorer post ever formed to study oceanography and marine biology has been established at Marineland of the Pacific.

Highlight of the nine-month program is the training of a dolphin by the Explorer Scouts themselves. At the end of the school year the dolphin will join other trained animals in the sea show.

THE EXPLORER Scout program

Twenty-four high school youths, all of them top-rated science students, are in the unique program. They were selected by school counselors at Palos Verdes and Rolling Hills High Schools on the Palos Verdes Peninsula and South High in Torrance.

The Gordon Setter is jet black with tan markings on the muzzle, tips of each paw, the hindquarters and over each eyebrow. The coat is shiny and soft, longer on the ears, underbody and legs. His poundage ranges from 45 to 75 and in height 23 to 27 inches.

program, operating under the auspices of the Boy Scouts of America, is designed to give students of high school age an opportunity to work in the field of their choice. At the same time the youngsters are provided unique contact with recognized authorities in that field.

"We are most happy to have this group of interested, alert youths at Marineland," William F. Monahan, executive vice president of the oceanarium, said. "We hope not only to give them facts and information about the ocean and related fields, but also to inspire them to continue their studies after they have left Marineland."

The group will meet once a month at the oceanarium and will study training of sea animals, aquariums, water collection and chemistry, diving, business aspects, veterinary problems, commercial fisheries, tidepool flora and fauna, zoology, and vocational opportunities. Members of Marineland's scientific and management staff will lecture.

A NUMBER of field trips, to be conducted on the weekends following the lecture sessions, have been planned. These include a dolphin capture aboard Marineland's collecting vessel Geronimo, tidepool collecting along the Palos Verdes shoreline, free diving in Marineland's 540,000-gallon fish tank which contains some 3,000 fishes of 100 different species, observation from the Geronimo of the gray whale migration, a sea lion count on Santa Barbara Island in cooperation with the California Department of Fish and Game, and

a visit to the Cabrillo Beach Marine Museum. Dr. Kenneth S. Norris, UCLA zoology professor and a scientist long associated with dolphin research, will discuss vocational opportunities with the students.

PERHAPS THE greatest aspect of the Marineland Explorer program is the dolphin training. The youth will be given a dolphin to train and the animal will be formally put into the oceanarium's Sea Arena show on June 18, 1967. "Training a dolphin ties most of the various scholastic aspects into one," said curator John Prescott. "It involves a knowledge of the animal, marine biology, veterinary medicine, food fishes and animal handling."

The dolphin will be kept in a holding tank and the training will be supervised by Marineland's training staff.
