Torrance Joins a Trend In Selecting Its Mayor

When Torrance voters gave overwhelming approval in 1957 to a proposal that the electorate choose the city's mayor instead of councilmen, they weren't pioneering any trails, according to Richard S. Childs, known widely as the "father of the council-

manager plan" in city government.

Citing figures compiled by the Municipal Year Book, Childs reports that 25 American cities made the same move during the 1953-1963 decade and that now such cities outnumber those in which the councilmen make the selection.

Writing in his authoritative study, "The First 50 Years of the Council-Manager Plan of Municipal Government," the man who started the whole thing more than half a century ago said such cities as Toledo, Dallas, Fort Worth, Worcester, and others had shifted to a plan whereby the voters chose the mayor. And the trend is continuing at a brisk rate, the compilations show.

The trend has grown to such an extent, Childs reports, that the model city charter, which recognized only the council-elected mayor in its 1915 version, was amended to provide for the election of the mayor by the voters in its sixth revision two years ago. The change was made, it was reported, because it was the major

reason for the council's resignation.
