

North, South Eye 'Consolation Prize'

This story is reprinted from the 1962, 1963, 1964 and 1965 editions of this sports page. It tells how each year North High defeated South High in their previous year's football game. It might be stated the names of the players have been changed somewhat to protect the innocent.

The very existence of a North-South game within the

same school district suggests a natural rivalry. But the only thing South High has to show for this is a 13-13 tie in 1960 and a total of 14 points since 1961.

There's not much to a South High football game that cannot be repeated each week, except that last Friday night the Spartans beat Mira Costa, 35-18, to end a four-year victory drought in the Bay League.

During the years since 1961

North has beaten South by scores of 19-7, 20-0, 39-0, 20-0, and 19-7. A 13-13 score this Friday night, it might be pointed out, would make it a perfect numerical palindrome!

Strange as it seems! Believe it or not! This game is momentarily 'dead even.' Of course, it hasn't been determined whether or not the football players celebrated Halloween in a manner unbecoming of a football team.

Just prior to last year's game, 17 Spartans turned themselves in to a "shocked"

North, however, had no reason to clean up his roster and went on to win the big game for the fifth year in a row.

In the spotlight for North are several members of last year's squad. They include Backs Jerry Ball and Rich Gonzales and Linemen Steve Sharp, Walt Wheelis.

Among the new crop are Quarterback Dan Hansen and End Tim Dillard.

In each category for South

are Quarterback Snapper Douglas, running backs Dale Hewitt and Jeff Arrieta, End Augie Felando, and Guard Bob Priestley, returnees, and newcomer Jeff Wang, a fine little back.

South won two non-league games before getting knocked off by Santa Monica, Redondo, and Inglewood in Bay League play. North divided a pair of practice games and lost to Inglewood and Hawthorne in the Bay League.

Both South and North earned victories over winless Mira Costa.

Going into Friday's game, North has a 1-2 league record and South is 1-3. The outcome is a matter of North keeping its precious victory string intact against South. The Spartans, however, are eager to do something about fixing the needle on the "broken record" that keeps repeating this satire over and over again.

Ocean Ave. Sump Sought by League

The Torrance Park and Recreation Commission is studying the use of the Ocean Avenue sump as a site for a Little League baseball diamond complex.

Appearing before the Park and Recreation meeting on Oct. 26 were officials from the Southwood Little League requesting the use of the sump for their League games beginning in April 1967. The Southwood Little League has been playing their League schedules on ground near the South Bay District Hospital, but are forced to move within a year, according to League President John Einfeld.

Use of the sump is being studied by the Commission and will be on the Commission's agenda at 8 p.m., Wednesday, Nov. 9.

The City Council Chambers are located in the City Hall, 3031 Torrance Blvd.

The Commission's concern is whether or not the people in the area are willing to accept Little League's use of the Ocean Avenue sump.

Chairman of the Commission, Bernard Dougan, said he hoped the people living in the area would contact the Commission in person, or by letter, to express their feelings.

Ocean Avenue sump is located south of Carson, north of Sepulveda, and west of Ocean Avenue in the City of Torrance. Those interested in the matter are invited to attend the next meeting of the Commission on Nov. 9.

Lakers Hobble Without Injured West and Baylor

Boston's World Champion Celtics and the Western Division runner-up Baltimore Bullets provide the Los Angeles Lakers with two rough encounters this week.

The Lakers and Celtics, who battled seven games to settle the NBA title last spring, meet in Boston tonight at 5:30 (PST).

Baltimore, which finished second behind the Lakers in the Western Division race last season, comes to the Sports Arena with a host of new faces for a game Friday night at 8:30.

The Lakers, with all-pro super-stars Elgin Baylor and Jerry West both on the injured list, will have to depend heavily on new faces to escape the Western Division basement. Word is expected later this week on how long Baylor will be sidelined with his knee injury, while hopes are high that West's heel may be sufficiently recovered for him to make his season debut on Friday night.

Former Laker LeRoy Ellis, former Celtic Mel Counts, and rugged rebounding and spectacular shooting Gus "Honeycomb" Johnson will lead the Bullets of new coach Mike Farmer. In the opening two weeks of play Ellis has been averaging better than 17 points and 15 rebounds a game; Johnson has been averaging 18.8 points per game,

Daniel Murphy High is the obstacle in the way of a seventh straight football win for Bishop Montgomery of Torrance. These two Camino Real League foes face each other Friday night at Rancho LaCienega Field in Los Angeles.

In two league games Murphy defeated St. Monica's, 18-0, but lost to St. Bernard's, 14-0.

Among Montgomery's two league wins is a 30-0 win over St. Bernard's.

The unbeaten Knights have a record of spurts. They either score in rapid succession or are unable to track themselves.

Montgomery had a 30-0 first half lead against St. Bernard, but was unable to connect at all in the second half. It took three quarters before Bishop was able to put Crespi away, 20-0.
