

Running Quarter Wins for North, 28-20

North High had too much running power for South Friday night and legged out another 28-20 cross-town victory. A rejected Spartan eleven walked away from the North Stadium with its sixth straight loss to their homecoming conquerors.

The game was all offense with North in command. The Saxons ran up a 21-6 lead at halftime and appeared headed for a rout, but the Spartans got as close as 21-20 in the final six minutes.

Coach Ed Levy of North said his line came through with a bang up job. He said he didn't mean to take anything away from the running backs. "We simply have become accustomed to the backs doing a great job all the time," he said.

Levy said tackles Steve Sharp and Rick Francis played their best game. He was quick to point out, "Jerry Ball has to be the best running back in the area!"

The North-South game furnished quite an assortment of running in this exhibition

alone. Rich Gonzales and Chris Farasopoulos shared the Saxon load with Jerry Ball. For South Jeff Arrieta and Jeff Wang booted for plenty of yardage.

The game was not two plays old before Dave Mikush of North recovered an alien fumble on the 18 yard line. After Jerry Ball went 10 yards, Chris Farasopoulos raced four yards in two tries for the TD.

End Tim Dillard booted the first of four place kicks for North. It was a valuable conversion inasmuch as Char-

lie Schindler of South went wide left on his first kick for a costly disadvantage.

The Spartan TD came with 5:53 left in the first quarter after Dale Hewitt ran back an interception to the North 15. Four plays later Wang took a quick pitchout two yards into the end zone.

But North walked away with a 7-6 lead and increased it to 14-6 and 21-6 in the second period.

The Saxons went 39 yards in 7 plays with Rich Creighton going five yards for the TD with 7:13 on the clock.

Their next exploit was for yard fake punt run by Arrieta. The Spartans got 27 yards from North in a spectacular touchdown catch of a 25-yard pass from Dan Hansen with 31 seconds left in the half.

To start the second half North drove from its own 20 yard line to the South 19, but a 15-yard penalty after the first down created a first-and-25 situation and killed the drive.

Penalties marred a considerable amount of the second half.

On their way to an 86-yard TD drive that included a 23-

yard fake punt run by Arrieta, the Spartans got 27 yards from North in a spectacular touchdown catch of a 25-yard pass from Dan Hansen with 31 seconds left in the half.

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outstanding lineman is to be singled out for South, the honor would go to tackle Steve Alcorn. A South victory would have been a big moral booster for the Spartans, but instead Coach Swift is living with his third straight losing season. The 20 points by North is the most scored against South in the history of the series.

The Spartans' season average is just under 24. Skip Enger, coach of the North's Class C football team and varsity basketball squad, filmed Friday night's varsity football game from the press box.

The most solemn moment of the evening was the postgame meeting of the two coaches where not a word was uttered.

Fields Needed By Southwood

Another hearing will be considered by the Torrance Recreation and Parks Commission Wednesday in behalf of a Little League. The Commission will determine the advisability of allowing the use of the Ocean Avenue sump for the fifth home of Southwood Little League.

As a strong advocate of Little League Baseball and serving as one of its officers, I have gathered some interesting data about the program.

First, it is strictly a matter of the homeowners and Recreation and Parks Commission to decide on their own convictions whether or not the Ocean Avenue sump becomes a ball park. What I have to offer is proof land must be provided somewhere in the area for this program.

I will use some simple arithmetic to stress the popularity of Little League and why consideration must be given to perpetuate it as part of the city's "master plan."

The population of Torrance is about 135,000 people. There are nine Little League boundaries in Torrance which equate to approximately 15,000 population each. The number of boys 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12 years of age in our schools is less than 9,000.

The combined number of boys in this Little League age who played ball last summer is a whopping 3,200. No other recreation activity in the world caters to 1-of-every-3 people in a given age group. Little League runs close to 40 per cent during its five-months-of-the-year invasion from March through July.

Murphy stayed on the ground to get its only touchdown as the final minute ticked away.

Graham completed 8-for-13 for 210 yards and ran his touchdown pass total to 18. He has gained 1130 yards through the air.

If Little League took only the most ideal 25 or 30 per cent of families in the community it would avoid a great deal of controversy and animosity. But the doctrines of Little League dictate that every youngster must be allowed to participate in the program if he desires and this policy is upheld regardless of the consequences.


Rolling Hills, whose only loss of the year is a 13-6 upset to Aviation of the Pioneer League, jumped off to a 21-0 halftime lead against Torrance.

Eight years ago the only section of Torrance which did not have a Little League franchise was the area bounded by Hawthorne Blvd., Sepulveda Blvd., Del Amo Blvd., and the Redondo city limits.

Hal Mayard scored twice on a 12-yard pass from Jon Robertson and a 67-yard burst. Hal set up the first score by running the ball 8 times for 45 yards. The 67-yard TD was on a reverse play.

Southwood Little League once again will undergo the unbelievable task of building a new plant. It would take this whole page to give the complete job description. But John Enfield, the president, is as eager to go to work as Ray Tibbens was several years ago.

Rolling Hills is host to Morningside next Thursday afternoon in the game that should decide the title. Both are 3-0 in league play.

Each team scored in the third quarter. Torrance got on the board on a 15-yard pass from Bill Bynum to Mark Hornbeck. Bill Walsh recovered a fumble to set up the score.

Torrance got within eight points of the victors in the fourth quarter when Hornbeck went 3 yards to climax a 99-yard drive.

But later John Weatherup recovered a fumble in the Torrance end zone to run the score to 28-13 and an anti-climatic 5-yard run by Bynum reduced the margin to 28-19 again.

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El Segundo Beats West

Eagles Score Twice in Last Period to Win 20-13 Thriller

El Segundo fired a shotgun twice in the final minutes Friday night to score a 20-13 come-from-behind win over West High in a Pioneer League football game.

Junior QB Brad Gentry fired a 31-yard pass to Craig Cousins with 16 seconds left in the game to break a 13-13 deadlock and disappoint a West High Grid Night crowd. The win boosted El Segundo into second place in the Pioneer League with a 2-0-1 mark. West is now 0-3.

West's Joel Hons actually came up with the football on the game-winning catch, but officials ruled Hons and Cousins both caught the ball and awarded the Eagles the touchdown.

The Warriors held a 13-6 edge when Gentry relieved starter Marty Engquist in the final period. Gentry immediately began using the shotgun and marched up field to the West 27-yard line. At that point, the Warrior defense stiffened and West took over with 6:42 left.

El Segundo tied the game 1:13 later as Randy Hayes broke lose from the West secondary and ran 20 yards for the touchdown. Hayes' score came on the heels of a 29-yard run by Corey LaMar.

DeWaide put West ahead again early in the second half with a 1-yard dive. The TD capped a 58-yard drive which required 11 plays, including a 15-yard pass interference penalty against El Segundo.

This time, Allen Coward's place kick was good and West led, 13-6. That's the way it stayed until Gentry cocked the Eagle shotgun in the fourth period. The 157-pound junior completed 8 of 13—all in the final period—for 129 yards and the two touchdowns.

Cousins caught four passes for 92 yards and the two TDs.

All total, the Eagles rolled up 319 yards, compared to 186 for West.

Lawndale moved into first place in the Pioneer League with a 33-6 win over Aviation. Lennox continues to share the basement with West.

West's Bill Brietzman then kicked and El Segundo recovered the football at mid-field. The Eagles moved to the 1-yard line, but failed to score and West got the football with 1:15 remaining.

But West failed to make the first down and Jim Parton's punt was whistled dead on the West 31-yard-line. Gentry again moved into the shotgun formation and heaved the bomb to Cousins.

West took a 6-0 lead in the

second quarter as DeWaide capped a 68-yard drive with a 5-yard run over left tackle. The touchdown was set up when Hons took a pitch-out from QB Coy Hall on a 4th-and-5 situation and made the first down.
