

AT OBSERVATORY

Visits to Two Planets Slated

Highlighting the sky's two largest planets, the current show "A Trip to Jupiter and Saturn," may be seen at the Griffith Park Observatory's planetarium theater daily except Mondays through Dec. 11.

To establish the space locale, the vast panorama of our solar system is projected on the 75-foot ceiling of the planetarium theater. The planets in their proper positions are viewed in the simulated darkened sky.

After observing the nine planets rotating in their respective orbits, audiences board the simulated space ship for a sightseeing trip to the largest of the planets, Jupiter. From close up, audiences can observe the giant planet's rotation around the sun and details of its atmosphere.

TRAVELING the space itinerary by means of the ingenious Zeiss planetarium machine, voyagers are then zoomed towards Saturn, landing on Titan, its largest satellite. This point offers a vista of the second largest planet, known for the spectacular rings which encircle it.

Dr. Clarence H. Clemenshaw, observatory director, advised that both planets can now be seen in the November sky through the telescope, with Jupiter rising in the east just before midnight and Saturn setting in the west a few hours later.

HOWEVER, he pointed out, the famous rings of Saturn

"Kids need to make music," Robert Simon, a Hermosa Beach musician and composer, says. Simon explains his reasons in a newly published book, "Threshold to Music, the Fourth Year."

Simon, an instrumental and choral music teacher for the Torrance schools, has been developing the methods behind his new book since 1955, when his first book was published as a handbook for teachers in the San Pablo School District.

The books explain the methods of teaching music to children and are designed for use both by classroom and private teachers, Simon said.

OTHER published books include "Songs in Motion," a textbook, and the first three years of the "Threshold to Music" series. Fearon Publishing Co. of Palo Alto is publisher.

Simon earned his musical degrees at New York University, San Francisco State College, and the Paris Conservatory in Paris. He is a native Californian.

HIS COMPOSITIONS have been performed by string trios, brass quartets, bands, orchestras, and mixed choral groups in the United States and France, and Simon, while teaching for the U. S. Government, composed and directed performances throughout France.

Variety of Bears Move To New Zoo

Bears come in a variety of sizes and colors, and some of each will be exhibited in the new Los Angeles Zoo opening Monday, Nov. 28, in Griffith Park.

There are seven species of bears known to exist in the world. They range in size from the small, about 125 pounds, Malayan Sun Bear, to the huge North American Kodiaks, the largest living carnivorous animal now roaming on land.

Shows are offered at 3 and 8:30 p.m. on weekdays, with added matinees at 1:30 and 4:30 p.m. on weekends and on Friday, Nov. 25.

northwestern areas of South America, and the Polar Bear.

PERHAPS THE rarest of the three types is the Spectacled Bear, so named because of the white rings around the eyes resembling eyeglasses. The Spectacled species is the only member of the bear family existing in South America. Only 14 are exhibited in U. S. zoos.

Other species in the new zoo include the American Black Bear, which comes in a variety of colors — black, chocolate brown, cinnamon brown, blue-black and white; the Asiatic Black Bear, a

small animal found in south and eastern Asia; and the colorful Sloth Bear from the forests of Ceylon and India.

ALL EXCEPT the Polar Bear will be exhibited in their native continental areas, Grizzlies, Kodiaks, and the American Black Bears will be located in the North American continental section; the Asiatic species—Black Bears, Sloth Bears, and Malayan Sun Bears will be found in the Eurasian exhibit area.

The huge Polar Bear will be exhibited in the Aquatic Section of the new zoo.
