Supervisors Adopt New Mutual Aid Agreements

Two agreements between Los Angeles City and County, authorizing mutual aid in fire protection and rescue services, have been approved, County Supervisor Burton W. Chace said today.

The agreements were authorized by Los Angeles County Supervisors Wednesday following the Los Angeles City Council's approval Oct. 11.

"These agreements are a fine example of the cooperation which exists between the various cities and the County," said Supervisor Chace. "They provide for maximum protection for residents."

Approval by the City of Los Angeles means that 45 of the 47 cities which maintain municipal fire departments in Los Angeles County have a mutual agreement with the County. Only Hawthorne and Vernon do not.

In addition, the remaining

29 cities in the County are served by the County Fire Department.

The agreements were developed by the County in 1964 in cooperation with the Los Angeles County Division of the League of California Cities.

Under terms of one agreement, Los Angeles City and County Fire Department will assist each other in cases of fire or local emergency which is beyond the control of the agency with jurisdiction.

The second agreement authorizes either Fire Department to respond on a first-alarm basis in the Santa Monica Mountains and in the Sunland-Tujunga area.

"These mountain and foothill regions have a long history of major brush fires," said Chace. "These agreements provide for immediate response in this limited area."
